An IPS-sponsored Pre Biennial Tour to Southern Thailand will immediately precede the 2012 Biennial with Pre-Tour dates of September 5-11.

Biographical Information on Candidates for IPS Board of Directors Positions 2012-2016

Cindy Adair (Southeastern USA) - Cindy is a practicing veterinarian and partner in a Virginia veterinary practice along with her husband. They plan to retire and move to their farm in Puerto Rico in a few years Cindy wrote ". I did not take a single course in Botany in college, but have always enjoyed plants of all kinds. Over the years, my husband and I have grown (or tried to grow) a bit of everything (including most hardy palms) in our suburban 3/4 acre lot, later adding two hobby greenhouses. A formal herb garden led to tropical spices. Chocolate, allspice and vanilla led to orchids and tropical fruit trees and finally ownership of a botanical collection in Puerto Rico. It was then (some five years ago) that I realized what a diverse group of wonderful palms existed." Searches on the internet for little palms for her husband's Christmas present led Cindy to IPS and PalmTalk. She has only been a member of IPS for two years, but enjoys frequently visiting and contributing to PalmTalk. She has also read and enjoyed the 5 years of back issues given to her. Cindy has been a long term member of two rare fruit groups without a local chapter, active in the Virginia greenhouse and orchid societies for many years as well as maintaining membership in the local botanical garden and Fairchild Gardens in Florida. She and her husband have attended several meetings of the Southeastern Palm Society and currently has over 250 different palm species planted with permanent Latin name labels. Cindy is also the mother of three wonderful children, all of whom helped plant her "Areca (vestiaria) Avenue" of more than thirty small palms in Puerto Rico. She writes "I hope that I can share my passion for palms with others and help out in some capacity with the IPS, now or in the future."

David P. Bleistein (Southwestern USA) – David Paul Bleistein's dream of growing palms outdoors came true when he moved to southern California in March of 1985. Dave joined the IPS and Palm Society of Southern California (PSSC) in 1993 and has been a member of both ever since. He has been a director of the PSSC since 2009, and was elected President in early 2012. Dave moved many times during his first years in California and planted palms in the ground at most of the places he lived, which included San Bernardino, Riverside, Long Beach, Monterey Park, Sunland, and Los Angeles; many still grow today. In October 2002, Dave bought his half-acre in La Habra, California and transformed it into a palmy paradise with 200+ species and over 500 palms in the ground, with more to come. David is an attorney in Los Angeles, specializing in complex civil litigation, collections, and foreign judgments, among other things. He has been an attorney since 1997 and graduated from Loyola Law School in Los Angeles, where he was on the Law Review. For undergraduate school, I attended the University of California, Riverside, and obtained a BA in History, Phi Beta Kappa, in 1992.

Tim Brian (Hawaii) – Tim's love of palms began at an early age after a trip to Hawaii where he had to touch every coconut palm in Waikiki. That once crazy kid's passion for palm trees is stronger than ever today. He was born and raised in Albuquerque, New Mexico, where he received a bachelor's degree in Architecture at the University of New Mexico. After graduating, he moved to San Diego where he became a registered architect and worked for many years as a project architect / project manager for a well known Southern California firm. Tim joined the Palm Society of Southern California in the early 1990's and his dream of creating a tropical palm garden came true after purchasing property in Hawaii in 2004. Tim served as Vice President of the Hawaii Island Palm Society (HIPS) in 2010 and is now beginning his second term as President of HIPS. He also created and maintains the HIPS website and has also been an active and contributing member of the IPS PalmTalk site since 2007. In addition to still doing consulting work for his San Diego architectural firm, he is also part of the team that helps maintain the fantastic palm collection at the Hilo Zoo. Tim now resides full time in Hilo, Hawaii with his life partner of 27 years and spends many hours maintaining and enjoying their one acre palm garden.

Jeffry Brusseau (Southwestern USA) – Jeff was born in Fargo, North Dakota on April 12, 1957, and is the oldest of five children. The family moved to Newport Beach, California in 1963, Jeffry attended private and public schools and graduated from the University of Southern California in 1980 with a business degree. His major areas of study were Real Estate/Finance. During his adolescence Jeffry became involved in botany and held several jobs in the field including, interior plant maintenance, exterior grounds maintenance, custom design and installations of high-end residential landscapes. After college, Jeffry pursued a career in Commercial Real Estate Development, Asset management and Construction and continues in that field today as a principal in charge of development activities with Newport National Corporation. Other involvements include membership in several plant societies, Board of Director and Officer positions in three commercial Owners Associations, the ownership of a commercial nursery and the restoration of the families Historical home. Jim Cain (South Central USA) – Jim has been an IPS member since the early 1970s, and played a key role in organizing the Houston Area IPS Chapter. Jim served as President of the IPS from 1992-1996 and then as Corresponding Secretary from 1996-2000. Jim has been the IPS Supplement Editor since the inception of the regular *Supplement* to *Palms*. This has strengthened Jim's goal of stronger rapport between the IPS and its worldwide affiliates – with emphasis on making the IPS more responsive to its full international membership

Paul Craft (Southeastern USA) – Paul is a horticultural consultant with over 35 years of experience in the nursery, landscaping, and landscape design industry. Palms have been a passion, having worked with over 1500 species and he has traveled extensively to learn about them in their native habitats. A resident of West Palm Beach, Florida, Paul was the founding president of the Palm Beach Palm and Cycad Society and has been a member of the International Palm Society for over 30 years, serving as its president from 2006 to 2010. His website, www.palmnutpages.com, is a young work in progress dedicated to anything and everything about palms.

John DeMott (Southeastern USA) — John, a South Florida resident involved with commercial ornamental horticulture for almost 40 years, is the owner and operator of Redland Nursery, Inc. He has introduced many "new" palms to the industry. John has worked closely with Montgomery Botanical Center and the Florida Nurseryman and Grower's Association in the development of a seed bank. John has been married to Carolyn for almost 38 years. They have two children: Jeffrey 28 and Jenifer 27. John was a fireman for 28 years, and holds a commercial pilot's license. His latest passion has been the forming of the "Florida Keys Botanical Center", a 501c3 corporation, which is being developed on a nine-acre site on Big Pine Key in Monroe County with hopes of maintaining germ plasm, primarily from the Caribbean Basin. John has served as an IPS Vice President and has served on the IPS Biennial, Website and Nominations Committees.

Haresh (Africa, Middle East and India) – Haresh lives in Madurai, in the state of Tamil Nadu, India, and has been studying and growing palms for over 30 years. Palms are the integral part of his plant hobby that also includes tropical flowering trees, succulents and orchids. As a business executive, his work provides extensive travel opportunities to visit gardens and growers in the US, Europe and in many parts of Asia. He brings his business management and international exposure to the society. Haresh is currently involved in developing two gardens near Madurai. He hopes to take more time off in the coming years to visit threatened habitats and to study the palm populations in his part of the world.

Susan Hubbell (Southeastern USA) — Susan, originally from Connecticut, earned a BA in interior design from Pratt Institute. She came to Puerto Rico over 30 years ago as an international staff member with Citibank where she managed the branch bank and major building design and construction department. Later she moved into the bank's financial area specializing as a trader of tax exempt CDs and marketing of banking products and account officer to local and international corporate clients. Her last position before retirement was as branch manager of the Spanish bank, Banco Central Hispano on the island of Culebra, Puerto Rico. She and her husband, Pedro Rodriguez, have a collection of over 50 palm species at their country home on Culebra. They have traveled extensively with the IPS and on their own in Europe, South America, in the USA as well as in the Caribbean via their sailboat and their private plane. Besides gardening, Susan's other interests include gourmet cooking, abstract acrylic painting and mosaics. Susan's principle residence is in San Juan, PR. She also has a home north of Orlando, FL so she is available to travel from either location to attend IPS board meetings. As a member of the IPS board Susan is hoping to increase IPS membership from the Caribbean area.

Tom Jackson (Southwestern USA) – Tom has been an International Palm Society member for more than 20 years and has attended almost all biennials in that time. A native of Wisconsin, his first exposure to palms was in the conservatories of the Midwest. Visits to family and botanic gardens in Southern California got him hooked on palms. While in Medical school, an externship in a small hospital on the Mosquito Coast of Nicaragua was his first exposure to the tropics. Tom moved to San Francisco to continue his education in a more palm friendly climate. While pursuing a career in hospital based pathology and blood banking, Tom and his wife, Kathleen Grant (an MD oncologist), purchased a home in Marin County and started their palm garden. A colleague, Dr. Herb Weber, introduced us to the IPS. Years have passed and the garden has matured. Besides palms it also features succulents, bamboos, ferns and rhododendrons. Tom writes "We have hosted many events including the Garden Conservancy, the American Rhododendron Society, the Northern California Chapter of the IPS and an IPS board meeting. We continue our avid interest in palms and travel to palm habitats. Our most recent trip was a visit to the forests of Borneo this April. I am an enthusiastic supporter of the IPS and look forward to working with the other board members to advance the goals of the IPS and its members."

Ken Johnson (Southeastern USA) – Ken saw his first palm at six years old and "it was in my yard!" At 14, he worked in a palm nursery pulling weeds. After college Ken again worked with palms and established his own palm specialty business . . . almost 30 years ago! He writes "On the way, I found the International Palm Society. I have served 6 years as president of my local chapter and have been a previous IPS board member. I look forward to the 2014 Biennial!"

Leland Lai (Southwestern USA) – Leland, a resident of Topanga, California, is former Vice President of the International Palm Society and a past President of the Palm Society of Southern California. Leland also heads up the Biennial Committee for the IPS. Born and raised in Hawaii, his love for tropical flora and fauna has captivated his work and outside interests with more than a passion. Leland has built his career assisting in the development of sustainable aquaculture: producing and distributing biological and artificial larval and maturation diets, designing hatchery modules for seed stocks, and providing biotechnology in the form of aquatic genetics for selective breeding.

Mike Merritt (Hawaii) — Mike is the son of a career Air Force officer and spent a childhood moving around a lot. A major early interest was growing plants, and his non-plant family watched in tolerant bewilderment as he planted rows of flowers in various backyards. His adult work was not related to plants, however, and culminated with a 25-year career with the U. S. Geological Survey as a Research Hydrologist working at various locations in Florida. While in Miami in 1980, a USGS colleague encouraged Mike to join the International Palm Society, and he began buying plants at the palm sales at Fairchild Tropical Garden. After relocating to central Florida in 1995, his interest in palms was greatly enhanced after a friend in the Central Florida Palm and Cycad Society convinced him that he could grow palms from seeds. After several years, his greenhouses were packed with tropical palms that had no hope of surviving planting out in central Florida. This problem was resolved after he bought eight acres of rocky soils land on the Big Island of Hawaii. His shadehouses are again packed as he gradually clears and plants his new property. While in central Florida, Mike served as Treasurer for the Central Florida Palm and Cycad Society and wrote many articles for the chapter's journal, *The Palmateer*. He currently serves as Treasurer for the International Palm Society and for the Hawaii Island Palm Society.

Francisco (Paco) Marti Navarro (Europe) – The chocolate, cocoa beans and coconut business has taken Paco to the Middle East and Asia for many years, introducing him to palms and their multiple uses. But his passion for all palms started when Paco became a member of the Spanish group *Amigos de las Palmeras*, and through them, the IPS. Since 2009, Paco is Secretary of the Spanish society *ABEPYC*. Travelling to the 2010 Rio Biennial, the 2011 mid-term IPS Board meeting in Tenerife, and organizing a Valencia post-tour for some of the IPS Board members after Tenerife provided Paco with the opportunity to meet other palm lovers. A group from *ABEPYC* went to visit Venezuela and the AVEPALMAS Venezuela Palm Society early in 2012, "where we have met old friends from IPS and made still more friends from the local society AVEPALMAS. Most importantly, we have learned more about their beautiful palms." Paco goes on to say "My aim is to continue working worldwide toward contributing to the broader knowledge of palms, especially in the Hispanic world."

Romeo Montalvo (South Central USA) – Romeo is an active member of the Palm Society of South Texas (PSST) and the International Palm Society. Romeo lives in Brownsville, Texas, and is a practicing pediatrician. He is a founding member of the Brownsville Botanical Gardens and Arboretum and is a Master Gardener. Romeo and his wife regularly host PSST meetings at their home. Romeo attended the 2010 Rio Biennial and would like to become more involved in the IPS leadership.

Kathryn Morgan (South Central USA) – Kathryn is a native resident of New Orleans, Louisiana. She received a BS in Chemical Engineering from Louisiana Tech University and is a process engineer at a refinery just outside of New Orleans. Kathryn got her love of plants from her mother and bought her first palm, a Phoenix roebelenii, in 1997. At that time, there were only a few common species of palms readily available in the New Orleans area, so Kathryn began germinating seeds of the more unusual palms that caught her attention. She has been a member of the IPS since 2001 and served as President for the Louisiana Palm and Cycad Society for over ten years.

Carlo Morici (Europe) – Carlo was born in Messina, Italy, in 1974 and has lived since 1995 in Santa Cruz de Tenerife, Canary Islands, Spain. He is a biologist specialized in palms and is also known for his landscaping projects. His palm research has been within the Group of Island Ecology, Department of Ecology, University of La Laguna, Tenerife. His field work has spread over various countries, but his research focuses on *Phoenix canariensis* and the palm flora originating in the Caribbean Islands, with a special focus on the genus *Coccothrinax*. In 2006, Carlo described a new palm species native to southeastern Cuba, *Coccothrinax torrida*, together with the Cuban botanist Raúl Verdecia. Carlo's landscape design projects include the Central Park of Arona and the Palmetum of Santa Cruz de Tenerife. He worked as a botanist in the palmetum during its formation years (1996–1999) and later designed new garden sections, such as those dedicated to the floras of New Caledonia, Hawaii and North America, as well as the gardens of the southern sea-facing slopes. Carlo joined the IPS at 17 years old in 1991 and became a life member 4 years later. He attended his first Biennial in Venezuela (1994) and has also attended Biennials in New Caledonia, France and Costa Rica.

Larry Noblick (Southeastern USA) – Larry was born in Ohio and has a B.S. in Biological Conservation (Wildlife Management), a B.S. in Education, and an M.S. in Botany from Ohio State University. He first became interested in palms while serving as a Peace Corps volunteer in Brazil (1978-80). He founded an herbarium at the Universidade Estadual de Feira de Santana (HUEFS) in Bahia, Brazil, and later returned and spent four more years developing it and continuing his studies on the palms of the Atlantic Forest Region. He came back to the U.S. in 1986 and obtained his Ph.D. from the University of Illinois at Chicago in 1991. He then went on to complete a post-doc at Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden, Miami, Florida and has worked at Montgomery Botanical Center, Miami, Florida since 1994 as their palm specialist, collections manager, and palm biologist. He has been a member of the IPS since 1987. In 2004, he was nominated as a director and became the administrative secretary in 2006, currently continuing to serve the IPS in both capacities.

Jack Sayers (Southwestern USA) – Jack is an Astronomer at California Institute of Technology. He moved from Denver to Los Angeles in 2002. Lindsey (his wife) and Jack now have a few hundred palms growing in their garden and several hundred more coming along in containers. He has been interested in plants since childhood and even convinced Lindsey to choose their home based partially on the palm-friendly microclimate! They joined both the International Palm Society and the Palm Society of Southern California (PSSC) in 2004. In 2006, Jack became a board member for the PSSC, on which he has served continuously since that time (and on which he continues to serve.) For PSSC, Jack has mainly worked on the production of the *Palm Journal*. Lindsey has also been a board member for the PSSC since 2006, serving as Secretary. Jack and Lindsey have attended the past three International Palm Society biennials, including pre- and/or post-tours for the past two biennials. He and his wife have also travelled on their own to see palms in habitat, including trips to Mexico, Madagascar, Australia, and Namibia. Jack writes "I would like to contribute to the International Palm Society by serving on the board of directors. In particular, I would like to use my love of palm-related travel to help with future biennial planning. I am also happy to assist with any committee work or general tasks that require additional support."

Grant Stephenson (South Central USA) - Grant's fascination with the plant world began at the age of three while working with his grandmother in her garden. After studying landscape design and architecture at Louisiana State University, Grant entered the horticulture industry. In the mid 1980's Grant joined the IPS. In 1993, Grant started Horticultural Consultants, Inc (HCI), with a vision of assembling one of the largest collections of cold hardy species of palms. HCI became a wholesale nursery focused on sale and distribution of specimen palms, bamboo and cycads worldwide. Grant designed and patented the Oasis Palm Tree Anchoring System, along with the Oasis Palm Cart, which can be used to move large specimens weighing up to 4500 lbs by hand. Zoos, botanical gardens, arboreta, and architects alike frequently rely on Grant as a consultant and for his ability to procure superior specimens and rare and coveted species. Grant has fielded gardening questions on popular local radio programs, provided advice to community groups and businesses concerned with environmentally sound solutions to landscape problems, and helped provide greenery to decorate the sets of PBS's Austin City Limits TV series. He also brought in rare, hard-to-find palms for local Texas chapters and sponsored lectures by Paul Craft, Alan Meerow, and Larry Noblick to educate and excite people about the wonders of palms. Grant was elected to the IPS Board of Directors in 2008 and looks forward to advancing the efforts of the IPS.

Scott Zona (Southeastern USA – Editor, PALMS, non-elected Director) –Scott is Florida International University's Conservatory & Greenhouse Curator, a position he has held since February, 2008. Previously, he was Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden's Palm Biologist, a position he held for 14 years. He holds a B.S. in horticulture and an M.S. in botany from the University of Florida. His Ph.D. in botany is from Rancho Santa Ana Botanic Garden and Claremont Graduate University, California. Scott grew up among pines and palms of Boynton Beach, Florida. He has explored for plants in Florida, California, Mexico, Central America, the Caribbean, Bermuda, the Pacific islands, Indonesia, Malaysia and Madagascar. His interests are in horticulture and plant diversity of tropical plants, especially palms, orchids, salvias and bromeliads. He has over 100 publications, both scientific and popular, on palms and other tropical plants. Scott is co-editor of the IPS quarterly journal, *PALMS*. He gardens in South Miami, where, ironically, his favorite palm, *Jubaea chilensis*, does not grow.
