2014 IPS BIENNIAL GENERAL INFORMATION South Florida, USA, May 24 – 30, 2014

Biennial registration is available via the Internet at www.palms.org. See details under Registration Procedures. For those using regular mail in registering, a Registration Form for the 2014 Biennial is included as pages 8 and 9 of this Supplement to Palms; it must be completed clearly and returned by the deadline. The early registration deadline is Friday, January 3rd, 2014, with a final registration and payment deadline of Friday, March 14th, 2014. Registrants must be IPS members before registering. Membership is available online for those not already members.

Details about the South Florida Biennial are given in this *Supplement* and will also be placed on the IPS website.

The IPS is not sponsoring any Pre-Biennial Tour or Post-Biennial Tours. However, two different Pre-Biennial events and one Post-Biennial tour are being offered by others. The New York Botanical Gardens (NYBG) is conducting an Amazon Palm Tour, and Caligo Ventures is offering a Natural History Tour of Trinidad and Tobago, both on May 14 – 23, immediately before the 2014 Biennial. In addition, the Florida Keys TREE Institute will conduct a trip to see Palms of Cuba on May 31 – June 8, right after the Biennial. Per the TREE Institute, this event will be fully licensed and permitted so that US residents can attend.

Each of these two events has their own registration procedures, fees and deadlines. The IPS is not handing registrations or information on either of these private events.

Biennial Overview

In 2014, the IPS is returning to its roots: South Florida, USA. South Florida is the birthplace of the Palm Society, the predecessor to the IPS, but the last Biennial to visit Miami was in 1992, just weeks after the region was devastated by Hurricane Andrew. The palms and gardens have made a complete recovery since that fateful August, so visitors will see palms and gardens at their best.

The Biennial will begin in Miami on Saturday, May 24, 2014. Miami in late May is usually sunny and warm but not oppressively humid and hot, so the Biennial participants should expect pleasant weather. The rainy season "officially" begins in June, but brief showers in May are always a possibility. The Biennial will take place before the start of the hurricane season.

The IPS Biennial will highlight the unique cultural blend that is Miami, along with the fantastic diversity of palms, in both public and private collections. Attendees will also get to see many native palms in their natural habitats. As always, seed collecting in parks is strictly forbidden (and subject to fines and/or imprisonment). Visitors must obtain owners' permission before collecting seeds from gardens.

Local IPS members who wish to attend the Biennial need not book rooms in the Miami hotel; however, ALL attendees must travel together in the chartered busses to ALL destinations. Private automobiles will not be allowed in many destinations on the itinerary, so attendees must be at the hotel in time for daily bus departures. Covered, valet parking is provided at the hotel; there is no self-parking. See additional registration information herein for Florida residents of Palm Beach, Broward, Dade and/or Monroe counties. All Biennial participants not residing in these counties *must* register for the full Biennial package, including hotels.

The airport serving Miami is Miami International Airport (MIA), and transfers between the airport and hotel are included in the Biennial registration. If attendees use any other airport, such as Ft. Lauderdale (FLL), they will be responsible for their own transportation to and from the airport and hotel.

Day-by-Day Biennial Schedule

The IPS cannot guarantee that the following itinerary will be followed precisely, but the overall Biennial dates will be maintained by the IPS Biennial organizers.

Members of the IPS Board of Directors should arrive on this day. Biennial participants arriving from great distances are encouraged to also book an extra night, so they will be fully rested when the Biennial begins on Saturday.

Biennial attendees arrive this day. Attendees will be met at Miami International Airport (MIA) and transferred to the hotel. The IPS Board meeting will take place on this day. The welcoming banquet at the host hotel will kick off the Biennial. The banquet will be followed by a presentation from Dr. Patrick Griffith, Director of Montgomery Botanical Center.

Day 2. Sunday. 25 May 2014

This will be a long day, starting with a bus ride to Highlands Hammock State Park. This park, about 3 hours by bus from Miami, has the southernmost populations of Rhapidophyllum hystrix and Sabal minor, as well as beautiful stands of Sabal palmetto and the ubiquitous Serenoa repens. A boxed lunch will be provided for a picnic in the park. After lunch, attendees will visit Archbold Biological Station, a working scientific research station in the sand pine scrub habitat of Florida. This unique habitat is where attendees will see the endemic Sabal etonia. The day will end with an outdoor barbecue hosted by a well-known palm nursery in Broward County and a late arrival back at the hotel.

Day 3. Monday, 26 May 2014

The first destination is just a few minutes from the hotel. We shall tour Pinecrest Gardens, the former site of the venerable Parrot Jungle. The palm collections, originally begun by one of the IPS founders, Nat De Leon, are mature and beautifully displayed in lush, tropical setting. Be sure to see the *Pholidocarpus macrocarpus*, grown from seed sent to Nat De Leon by Hal Moore in 1966.

A few minutes away is Fairchild Tropical Botanic Garden, where participants will spend the rest of the day. Lunch will be provided in the Garden, and visitors will be able to explore at their leisure one of the epicenters of palm horticulture. The Garden, founded in 1938, comprises 33.5 hectares (83 acres) of palms and other tropical plants, laid out according to a design by renowned landscape architect William Lyman Phillips. Even if you have visited FTBG before, you are sure to see something new. If you have not visited FTBG before, prepare yourself for exceptional palms and gorgeous vistas throughout the Garden. IPS participants will stay after hours to enjoy cocktails as the sun sets, followed by a special banquet and an illustrated presentation by FTBG Director, Dr. Carl E. Lewis.

Day 4. Tuesday, 27 May 2014

On this day, the group checks out of our Miami hotel and begins a bus tour to Key West, with two bus groups. The first destination will Everglades National Park Acoelorraphe wrightii and Roystonea regia. Mahogany Hammock and Royal Hammock will be visited sequentially by the two bus groups. The busses will continue south making two more stops. The first set of busses will stop at Bahia Honda State Park to see a population of unusually tall Coccothrinax

argentata. The other set of busses will visit a private garden in the middle Keys. Not ordinarily open to tours, this garden features an exceptional collection of palms doing very nicely next to the salt water. On the return trip, on Thursday, the busses will switch, so every bus will visit every destination. All of the busses will arrive in Key West just in time for a group dinner.

The IPS group will board the busses for the return trip north, stopping at the sites from Tuesday, as well as two additional private gardens {Is it 2 or 3; as Thursday's schedule lists. These professionally designed gardens, like the previous one, are not normally open to visitors, so Biennial attendees will have a rare glimpse of two stunning private gardens. One is

a 4.5-hectare (11-acre) estate that maintains a large palm collection on a point of land jutting out into the Atlantic. The other is a 2-hectare (5-acre) garden contains many unusual and mature palms. Once back in Miami, the group will meet for dinner, followed by presentation on the palms of Cuba by Paul Craft.

Biennial Location: The Biennial will begin and end at the Miami Marriott Dadeland hotel in Miami, Florida. Attendees are advised to ensure that they are compliant with US Visa requirements and to make their airline reservations early.

The IPS cannot guarantee that the itinerary will be followed precisely, but the overall Biennial dates will be honored by the IPS.

Key West hotel lodging is <u>NOT</u> included in these rates which are available **only** for Monroe county residents.

Not included in the Biennial registration fee are personal expenses such as laundry, telephone, gratuities, bar charges, extra meals, trip insurance, airfare, and airport charges for all flights to and from Miami.

Also not included in the Biennial registration fee are any hotel costs and meals for early arrivals (earlier than Saturday, May 24th), or for those staying over *after* the night of Friday, May 30th, or later nights.

Partial Registration: Because a number of attendees will be local residents of Palm Beach, Broward, Dade and Monroe counties, registrations for partial Biennial attendance is being made available to residents of those counties (and only for residents of those counties) at reduced rates as described below.

Those attendees residing locally in Palm Beach, Broward, Dade and/or Monroe counties (only) can elect a partial registration price structure from the following:

- 1. Full package (both hotels)
- "No Miami hotel" option, available only for residents of Palm Beach, Broward and/or Dade Counties
- 3. "No Key West hotel" option, only available for residents of Monroe County,

Detailed costs for these partial registration options are given under Registration Costs section, along with details as to who can apply.

These partial registration prices cannot be expanded into other Florida counties due to IPS minimum hotel room number contractual requirements.

Any other attendees with "special schedules" (i.e., partially attending the Biennial) must pay the full registration fee and arrange their individual transportation to meet the group and to accommodate their specific needs. All attendees will be charged the regular fee regardless of where they plan their accommodations, except for those residing in the aforementioned four South Florida counties.

Air Travel to/from Miami, Florida:

Attendees are responsible for booking and paying for their own flights to/from Miami. It is also suggested you book your flights before you register for the Biennial. The primary airport for the Biennial is Miami International Airport (MIA).

Book now! Be prepared for possibly strict, time-consuming security inspections at all

airports for all flights. Non-US residents should make sure your passport does not expire within six months of the date of return travel from the Biennial.

REFUND POLICY

The IPS must pre-pay non-refundable deposits to some vendors. Therefore, strict refund policies described below apply to the 2014 Biennial. This policy does not apply to any airline tickets or extended lodging booked separately by attendee (outside of the IPS Registration process). For those, check with your travel agent for applicable refund policies.

- Refunds requested on or before end-of-day Friday, January 3rd, 2014: Full refund minus ten percent (10%).
- Refunds requested from Saturday, January 4th, 2014 but before end-of-day March 14th, 2014: 50% refund of amount paid.
- Absolutely no refunds allowed after March 14th, 2014.

<u>Airport Reception and Transportation</u> to Hotel:

Attendees will be met at Miami International Airport (MIA). IPS arrivals will be met at either baggage exits (for US arrivals) or at exits from the customs area (for non-US arrivals) and will be provided free IPS transportation to the Marriott Dadeland hotel in Miami, but only if attendees have informed the IPS Biennial Registration Contact Staff with their flight arrival and departure information at least seven (7) days before their arrival. If you wish to be met at the airport and will be arriving Miami prior to May 24th, you will be responsible for your own airport transfer and for your transport to the Biennial hotel on May 24th.

TRINIDAD and TOBAGO NATURAL HISTORY IPS TOUR 2014 INFORMATION

Dates: May 14 - 23, 2014

<u>Participants:</u> Exclusively offered to members of the International Palm Society.

General Overview: Based at the worldrenowned Asa Wright Nature Centre and Lodge, a 200-acre wildlife sanctuary in rainforested Northern range, Trinidad's participants will travel with expert local guides to visit several unique natural areas on the island. While focusing primarily on the avifauna, your tour has been tailored for general wildlife enthusiasts and will include a visit to one of the most active Leatherback in the world. beaches turtle nesting Participants will also fly to the sister island of Tobago, where your trip will be based at the beachfront Blue Waters Inn.

DAY 1 ARRIVAL at Piarco International Airport in Port-of-Spain you will clear Immigration and Customers, meet your driver and transfer to the Asa Wright Nature Centre and Lodge, one of the first not-for-profit ecolodges in the Tropics.

DAY 2 CENTRE GROUNDS / DISCOVERY TRAIL / OILBIRD CAVE.

Morning begins with the raucous noise of the Crested Oropendola and a host of other exotic sounds. A first-time visitor might see 20-30 life birds before breakfast, and 40 species overall. Birding from the veranda of the Asa Wright Nature Centre is one of the world's most pleasant, and exciting, ornithological experiences. Ruby-topaz Hummingbird, Tufted Coquette, Barred Antshrike, Green Honeycreeper are among the many species that can be easily seen.

Our day will start with a guided tour of the several trails that traverse this rich and diverse wildlife sanctuary. On our introductory walk we should see such species as Bearded Bellbird, Trinidad Motmot, Violaceous Trogon, Channel-billed Toucan, Chestnut Woodpecker, White-bearded and Golden-

headed Manakin, Rufous-browed Peppershrike, Turquoise and Bay-headed Tanager. The Centre is situated in a typical valley of Trinidad's Northern Range. These sites have been traditional centers of coffee, cocoa, and citrus plantations and many of these plants are still maintained at the Centre. Natural second-growth has taken over and festooned the abandoned plantation vegetation with vines and a host of epiphytes. The whole effect is one of being deep in a tropical rainforest.

After lunch, we will visit Dunston Cave, a beautiful riparian grotto located on the sanctuary, to view the breeding colony of the fascinating nocturnal Oilbird. This is one of the most accessible Oilbird caves in the entire world and access is limited to protect this rare species. On the short hike to the Cave, you could see some of the secretive birds of the deep forest such as Redcrowned Ant-Tanager, Antthrush, White-bellied Black-faced Antbird, and Gray-throated Leafscraper. Along with rich birdlife, we will also have an opportunity to examine the fascinating world of leaf-cutter and army ants, and photograph orchids and other tropical flora

DAY 3 NESTING LEATHERBACK TURTLES AT MATURA.

You'll have a free morning to explore the Centre's trails, take a dip in the natural stream-fed pool, check out the new photographer's blind behind the cocoaroasting shed, or simply relax and soak in the splendor of the Northern Range. While you're walking the Centre grounds, and driving out of the Northern Range on the Blanchisseuse-Arima Road, stay alert for Swallow-tailed Kite, Common Black Hawk, Ornate Hawkeagle, Bat Falcon and White-tailed Trogon along with some of the more secretive forest birds such as Silvered Antbird, as well as special tanagers such as Speckled Tanager and Blue Dacnis.

In the late afternoon we will depart for Matura Beach, one of the worlds' largest and most productive Leatherback Turtle nesting sites. Our hosts are NatureSeekers, an award-winning, community-based organization that has turned a community of one-time poachers and net fishermen into environmental stewards. After a sunset rum punch and picnic dinner, we will stroll this protected 12-mile stretch of undeveloped beach with our local guides, waiting for the giant Leatherback

females to drag themselves onto the sand to lay their eggs, which typically take 60 to 70 days to reach gestation.

DAY 4 ARIPO SAVANNAH & THE ARIMA MARKETS.

This morning's journey to the lowland

Aripo Savannah could provide yet another batch of new species. In the savannah, Plumbeous Kite, Grey-headed Kite, Savannah Hawk, Shiny Cowbird, Giant Cowbird, White-headed Marsh Tyrant, Red-breasted Blackbird, Yellow-rumped Cacique, Blueblack Grassquit, Southern Lapwing, White and Ruddy-breasted Seedeater are likely to be seen. The Aripo Savannah is an area of extremely acidic soil with poor drainage, and is a remnant of what once was a major habitat type of lowland Trinidad. These remnant savannahs are now surrounded by extensively altered landscapes where much sugar cane is grown, as well as small-scale agriculture and housing development sprawl. If we have time, we'll drop by the nearby Wallerfield area, a World War II U.S. air base, to search for Redbellied Macaw and Moriche Oriole. On the return, we'll make a quick stop in the center of Arima to visit the local markets and pick up some of the local flavor.

DAY 5 NARIVA SWAMP AND BUSH BUSH.

Today we will wind our way out of the Northern Range to Trinidad's east coast and the Nariva Swamp, the largest freshwater herbaceous swamp on the island. Along its edges are "palm islands," where the tall Moriche Palm is common. Here too we will see a unique mangrove community, made up primarily of the stilt-rooted rhizophora mangrove, which often reaches a height of 80 feet. Along the way we will look first in the lowland habitats for such species as Savannah Hawk, Red-breasted Blackbird, Southern Lapwing, White-headed Marsh Tyrant and Greenrumped Parrotlet. In the coastal area we will have an opportunity to look for Pinneated Bittern, Pearl Kite, Azure Gallinule, Wattled Jacana, and Red-bellied Macaw. There is a swimming opportunity here, in the Atlantic, and you may choose to bring a swimsuit. Keep a look out in the surf for the fascinating Foureyed Fish. We will also make a special visit to Bush Bush, a remote island located in the middle of this marshy habitat. In addition to the Red-bellied Macaws and various

parrots, the island is one of the best places in Trinidad to encounter Red Howler and Whitefaced Capuchin monkeys and, on rare occasions, the silky anteater.

DAY 6 WATERLOO HINDU SITES / CARONI MARSH

After an early breakfast, we will head west, into the marshy lowlands just south of Port of Spain, toward the sleepy seaside village of Waterloo. A center for sugarcane and rice production. Waterloo is an important historical site for many Trinidadians of Indian descent. Waterloo was the official port of entry for many of the Indians brought to Trinidad to work in the rice and sugarcane fields, who have become one of the dominants forces in the island's culture and politics. With our eyes still pealed for rare marsh species, we will stop at the Siewdass Sawdoo Temple in the Sea. Sawdoo's original shrine, built right after World War II was destroyed by the government in support of local sugarcane interests. Undeterred, Siewdass spent the next 25 years building another version in the middle of the water. Sawdoo died before his masterpiece was completed. 1994. the Trinidadian Ironically. in government completed the octagonal temple in the middle of the water to commemorate the 150th anniversary of first Indians arriving in Trinidad. We will also stop to marvel at the fascinating Dravidian style architecture of the Dattatreya Mandir ashram, temple and yoga retreat. Fourteen stonemasons were flown in from India to work alongside local artisans to create the filigree ornaments and life-sized elephant statues at the entrances to the meditation center. Adjacent to the complex stands the an 85-foot shrine to the warrior Hanuman -- reputed to be the largest one of its kind outside of India.

From Waterloo, we will drive to the world-renowned Caroni Marsh sanctuary, a very specialized mangrove forest that contains several genera and species of mangroves, showing classic examples of plant adaptation in this unique brackish water community. We will seek out some of its more specialized denizens — Neotropical Cormorant, Anhinga, Striated Heron, White-cheeked Pintail, Largebilled Tern, Pied Water-tyrant, Bicolored Conebill, and Red-capped Cardinal. Our day will end with the spectacular flight of Scarlet Ibis returning to their mangrove roosts at

dusk, truly one of the world's most dramatic natural moments. Returning to the boat dock we will search the mangrove-lined channels for the mysterious sounding Common Pootoo.

DAY 7 TRANSFER TO TOBAGO/BON ACCORD MARSHES.

Today we will depart for Trinidad's sister island of Tobago, which forms the final link in the chain of mountain ranges extending from the Venezuelan Coastal Range, on the very edge of the South American Continental Shelf. Tobago's climate and rainfall more closely resembles that of the Lesser Antilles, meaning it is drier and windier like the traditional Caribbean Islands, versus Trinidad which has a climate more akin to the northern portions of South America.

Upon arrival in Crown Point, we will make a quick stop for drinks and then head to the Bon Accord marshes and Hilton Plantation ponds. At these marsh habitats, we will be searching for shorebirds, herons, egrets, and ducks, such as the White-cheeked Pintail and the Masked Duck. We will take a leisurely drive along Tobago's southern coast, skirting the edge of the capital city of Scarborough, stopping en route for some photo opportunities atop the winding, craggy cliffs overlooking the crystalline Caribbean Sea. We will arrive in time for lunch at our home for the next three nights, the lovely Blue Waters Inn, nestled into a cove outside the town of Speyside called Batteaux Bay. You will have the afternoon free to unwind, take a relaxing swim or snorkel off the beach, or grab a cocktail and enjoy the new infinity pool. Blue Waters has a complete dive shop.

DAY 8 LITTLE TOBAGO ISLAND

This morning, weather permitting, we will depart by boat for Little Tobago Island, one of wildlife important this nation's most sanctuaries. As we cross over to the island, the skies will fill with Magnificent Frigatebird and a large variety of terns. We will watch for Leatherback and Hawksbill Sea Turtles and enjoy spectacular views of one of the Caribbean's most beautiful and pristine coral formations, all from the comfort of our glassbottom boat. Upon landing we will explore the island for Chivi Vireo, Browncrested Flycatcher and Pale-vented Pigeon. In addition, depending on the time of the year, we will explore the nesting colonies of Redbilled Tropicbird, Red-footed Boobies, Brown Boobies, Sooty Terns and Brown Noddies. We will return to Blue Waters for lunch. If you're interested in an optional afternoon trip snorkeling the offshore reefs at Goat Island and just beyond Batteaux Bay, simply inquire with our boat captain from Frank's Boat Tours and his helpful crew.

DAY 9 ARGYLE WATERFALL AND THE RAINFOREST.

This morning, we will have an early breakfast and then depart, with picnic lunches, for one of Tobago's most famous natural sites: Argyle Waterfall, Later, we will head further up the Road into the Rainforest Roxborough Preserve, where Tobago's best mountain forests are found at elevations exceeding 2,000 feet. Founded in 1764 to prevent widespread logging and deforestation by colonial timber interests, the preserve protects more than one-third of the entire island, and is one of the oldest protected rainforests in the Western Hemisphere.

We will pass among charming quiet villages, to the forested interior at Gilpin Trace to look for White-tailed Sabrewing, once thought to be extinct but rediscovered here in the 1960s. We will also seek out Blue-backed Manakin, Yellow-legged Thrush and other Tobago such as Red-crowned specialties, Woodpecker, White-fringed Antwren and Venezuelan Flycatcher. Time permitting, we'll reach the top of the Roxborough Road, to sample the rocky cliffs and villages on the Northern Coast before we return to Blue Waters.

DAY 9 This exciting and educational tour draws to a close as you depart after breakfast for our return flights to Trinidad and our international departures back to the US.

Itinerary is subject to change due to weather, road condition, access, and other real world factors. The order of the trips may also change. Should a location or region become unviable, we will make every effort to visit an equivalent location or region.

Palms of Cuba

As described below, all inquiries, registrations, etc., for the Palms of Cuba tour must be addressed to the Florida Keys Tropical Research Ecological Exchange Institute (TREE Institute). This event is not sponsored by the IPS.

A visit to Cuba immediately following the 2014 IPS Biennial has been planned. This trip will be conducted by the Florida Keys TREE Institute and, per the TREE Institute, will be fully licensed and permitted so that US residents can attend.

A trip to Cuba is a palm lover's dream. There are roughly 90 taxa of palms native to the 700-mile long island and this trip will take place primarily in the central area where some of the greatest palm diversity occurs. All travel arrangements will be handled by the Florida Keys TREE Institute and the registration fee is all inclusive from Miami except for one dinner to experience on your own in Havana. Experts on the Cuban palms will be on hand at all times to answer questions and provide help in their identification.

A sampling of palms that will be seen in habitat include Acrocomia crispa, Bactris Coccothrinaxs garciana, plumeriana, litoralis, C. miraguama, C. moaensis, pseudorigida, C. salvatoris, C. species 'Azul', Colpothrinax wrightii, Copernicia baileyana, C. cowellii, C. fallaensis, C. hospita, C. rigida, C. yarey, Gaussia princeps, Hemithrinax rivularis, Pseudophoenix sargentii, Roystonea regia and Sabal maritima. A visit to the 600-hectare National Botanical Garden in Havana is also planned. There will also be opportunities to experience the rich culture of Cuba and do some sightseeing in Havana.
