Year 2000 IPS Directors

Attention all members: It is not early for you to consider nominations for the Board of Directors of the International Palm Society for the term 2000 to 2004. The elections will be in the summer of 2000, but it is suggested that persons interested in nominating someone for a position contact Libby Besse, head of the Nominating Committee the or Administrative Secretary, McKamey.

After the last election, members suggested to the IPS that we better publicize how IPS Directors and Officers are nominated and elected, as well as explain the duties expected of the IPS Directors.

Requirements for consideration as an IPS Director are simple and straightforward. Most of the following information is extracted from the IPS By-Laws.

Nomination procedure and requirements: Members in good standing may propose candidates for nomination by writing to the Secretary of the Society. A nomination must be accompanied by the written consent of the proposed candidate to serve if nominated by the committee and elected by the membership, and another member must second it, in writing.

A member of The Society must be in good standing for two years before being nominated for as an officer or a director.

Each candidate must complete and return a questionnaire provided by the Secretary. If the above conditions are met, the Secretary shall forward the candidate's name to the Nominating Committee Chairperson (Libby Besse) for consideration of being selected as a nominee on the ballot.

Automatic IPS Director Election for Specified Positions: The immediate past President automatically becomes a member of the Board for the

two years following the expiration of his term as President.

In addition, the Editor or Co-Editors of *Palms* (formerly *Principes*) and operators of the IPS Seed Bank [if functioning] and the IPS Bookstore shall automatically be on the Board of Directors for as long as they are serving the Society in this capacity, or by adverse action of the Board of Directors.

Nominating Committee Ballot and Election Guidelines: Directors are elected for a four-year term, with terms staggered so that approximately half the Directors shall be elected at each Biennial Meeting. No one region may have more than eight directors serving on the board at any one time.

The Nominating Committee will use the regional distribution of members as a guide to selecting representation worldwide. A decision was reached at the 1998 Biennial Directors' meeting to add three more Director positions to the board, with these three positions to be used to increase board participation from geographical areas with little or no representation (if based solely on the number of members in those areas). These new positions will be filled in the year 2000 and 2002 elections.

Based on the above guidelines and the number and qualifications of nominees, the Nominating Committee will prepare the slate of Nominees for Directors and associated ballot. The goal is to have a number of candidates for each board position, but this obviously depends on receipt of sufficient qualified nominations.

The Ballots will be mailed out with an early year 2000 issue of *Palms* (formerly *Principes*) to all paid members. Voting for Directors by the IPS membership shall be by mail only. Ballots shall be mailed in time for the results to be announced at the Year 2000 Biennial Meeting to be held in New Caledonia.

The Nominating Committee) will nominate the IPS Officers for 2000-2002 from members of the full Board of Directors; both those Directors

presently serving the 1998-2002 term and those Directors who will be newly elected for the 2000-2004 term. The Officers will then be elected by a majority vote of the Board of Directors present during the first Directors' meeting at the Biennial 2000.

<u>Duties and Expectations from IPS</u>
<u>Directors</u>: The Directors have general charge and direction of the affairs and business of the Society, the care and management of the Society's funds and other property, with power to invest, reinvest and transfer the same at their discretion. Directors are expected to take an active role in these activities and serve on appropriate committees set up to concentrate on specific tasks or concerns.

While not an absolute requirement, an ability and willingness to travel to all (or most) IPS board meetings at the Director's own cost is, by necessity, a strong consideration used by the Nominating Committee when selecting the names to go on the election ballot. Even in this day of email, it is difficult to fulfill the above requirements to conduct the society business without attending board meetings. Email access is also a very useful tool.

The Board of Directors shall consist of up to thirty-four members, including Officers. All Directors must be notified at least ten days in advance of Board Meetings.

Newly elected Officers and Directors take office immediately after the close of the Biennial meeting at which they were elected. A meeting of the new Board of Directors will then be held for the approval of newly appointed committees. Newly elected Officers and Directors are also invited to observe at the last meeting of their predecessors.

The board meets at least once per year (at the Biennial and Mid-Term Directors meetings). At each of these, Directors are usually tied up in business meetings (conducting the business of the society) for at least one full day. Sometimes additional directors meetings are required.

A quorum for all purposes shall be eleven Directors. All actions of the

Directors shall be by a majority of those present at a duly constituted meeting. Directors must be present in order to vote.

Any Officer or Director failing to pay dues shall be dropped from office and may be replaced by another appointed by the Board to fill the unexpired term.

If Officers or Directors are removed for cause including inattention to the conduct of the Society's affairs or general ineptitude, the vacancies or vacancy so occurring shall be filled by a majority vote of the Directors at their next meeting for the unexpired term of such removed Officers or Directors.

Executive shall be an Committee of the Board of Directors. It shall serve at the call of the President and/or Vice-President, who shall serve as Chairman. There shall be at least four other Directors, who shall be appointed from time to time by the President and/or Vice-President. Directors shall be notified of all Executive Committee meetings and any Director attending shall also be a member of the Executive Committee for The minutes and that meeting. and actions decisions reached recommended at such meeting shall be circulated to non-attending Directors for their approval or disapproval. This is currently done by email to most Directors, with a very few distributed by regular mail or fax. Approval by a sufficient number of Directors which, when added to the number serving on Executive committee at and which constitutes meeting, majority of the Board, shall "render actions of the Committee of the same force and effect as actions taken by the full Board of Directors at a duly conducted meeting".

We hope the above information gives every IPS member a better understanding of what is required to become an IPS Director, as well as the nomination and election process. Hopefully, it will also give potential candidates some idea of what is expected from them if elected.

PAULEEN SULLIVAN – THANKS FOR THE YEARS OF SERVICE

Pauleen Sullivan resigned from the IPS Bookstore effective December 31, 1998 after successfully running the Palm Society Bookstore for over 25 years! Our society expresses appreciation to Pauleen for those many years of outstanding service.

Pauleen was born in Oregon, but moved to Ventura, California, as a young girl with her family. She attended Ventura high school and married her high school sweetheart, Joe Sullivan. Pauleen "became interested in palms and active in the Palm Society while raising two sons on the side".

In 1950, Pauleen was stricken with polio while pregnant with her youngest son. She was in bed for almost a year. In that time, her late husband Joe cared for Pauleen's plants so they would survive in her absence. He became a palm enthusiast in his own right. Joe and Pauleen started a nursery in the early 1950's.

In 1956, Pauleen heard about the fledgling Palm Society from Dave Barry and joined. She got out of the palm business in 1969 but her interest in palms continued.

Joe died of a heart attack suddenly while he and Pauleen were on a 1975 field trip in Indonesia collecting palm seeds.

The Palm Society Bookstore just "happened". As she put it in an interview for an earlier Principes article: "At the Palm Society meetings in 1973, different members kept coming over to me and asking where to get Palms of the World. Most bookstores, I guess, had trouble supplying it. I asked my husband if we could go ahead and buy copies of the book for me to sell at meetings. He said okay, and the monies we made were given to the local chapter. That was how the Bookstore actually got started. Later came Supplement to Palms of the World and we were then able to sell two palm books at the meetings. After a while, the IPS Directors decided that the 'store' was a beneficial feature and I was asked if I would sell palm books on a regular basis to all members". The IPS Bookstore had 29 book titles and 5 palm papers by the summer of 1988 and many more today. Over recent years, Pauleen has shipped over 1000 books per year.

Pauleen has also served the Society as IPS Secretary, IPS Vice President, Chapter Chairperson and Publications Chairperson, as well serving continuously on the IPS Board of Directors since 1976.

Pauleen also lead successful drives to help finance the publication of *Genera Palmarum* and to finance supplemental color for *Chamaedorea Palms*.

Pauleen has visited numerous places including Australia, Central America, Brazil, Venezuela, New Guinea, Borneo, Sulawesi, Sumatra, Malaysia, Thailand, and the South Pacific.

Pauleen has an excellent palm garden at her home in Ventura, California, featuring palm species from around the world. Her collection includes Chambevronia hookeri, macrocarpa, Chamaerops humilis, Chamaedorea sullivaniorum (named for Pauleen and Joe by Don Hodel), C. plumosa, Dypsis decipiens, D. leptocheilos, utilis. D. onilahensis. Hedvscepe canterburyana, monticola, Ravenea Pinanga jayana, P. elmeri and a 30-foot tall Ceroxylon ventricosa. There are more than 125 palm species growing outdoors plus about 30 more species inside her poolroom.

In addition, Pauleen has purchased a 6.5-acre parcel in Kapoho, on the big island of Hawaii. She has over 100 palm species in the ground there. Her son Terry has helped her implement several features there.

Although confined to a wheelchair, Pauleen continues to travel extensively, enjoying visiting palms and Palm Society members around the world.

Pauleen started attending IPS Biennials in the early 1970's and has missed very few Biennials and IPS Directors meetings since.

Again, from the International Palm Society – Thank you, Pauleen, very much!
