Call for Nominations for IPS Directors

It will soon be time for the election of those IPS Directors who will serve from the year 2002 to 2006. In order to have a meaningful election, if you or anyone you know can contribute to the goals of the International Palm Society and are willing to dedicate the time necessary to serve as a Director, please have his/her name submitted for nomination.

The election will be early in 2002. As required by IPS By-laws, nominations must be received by the Administrative Secretary, Libby Besse, not later than December 15, 2001 to allow for verification, submission to the nominating committee and preparation of the ballots.

In accordance with our By-laws the procedure for nominations and requirements for Directors are explained below.

Nomination procedure and requirements: Members in good standing may propose candidates for nomination by

writing to the Secretary of the Society. This must be accompanied or followed by a second nomination from another member in good standing and a written consent of the proposed candidate to serve if nominated by the nomination committee and elected by the membership. This required documentation should be sent by email or regular mail to the Administrative Secretary, Libby Besse, with copy to Nominations Committee Chairman Sue Rowlands. Email and mail addresses are given for both at the end of this article. Remember that the deadline for receipt of nominations and supporting documentation is **December 15, 2001**.

A member of the Society must be in good standing for two years before being nominated for a position as a director.

Each candidate must submit a short biography including palm- interest activities to the Administrative Secretary. If the above conditions have been met, the Secretary shall forward the candidate's name to the Nominating Committee Chairperson (Sue Rowlands) for consideration of being selected as a nominee on the ballot by the Nominating Committee.

Nominating Committee Ballot and Election Guidelines: Directors are elected for a four-year term, with terms staggered so that approximately half the Directors shall be elected at each Biennial meeting. The Nominating Committee will use the regional distribution of members as a guide to selecting representation worldwide.

The ballots will be mailed out with an early year 2002 issue of *Palms* to all paid current members. Voting for Directors by the IPS membership shall be by mail only. Each voting member must mark and mail his own ballot. Ballots shall be counted in time for the results to be announced at the year 2002 Biennial to be held in France.

Duties and Expectations from IPS Directors: The Directors have general charge and direction of the affairs and business of the Society, the care and management of the Society's funds and other property, with power to invest, reinvest and transfer the same at their discretion. Directors are expected to take an active role in these activities and serve on appropriate committees set up to concentrate on specific tasks or concerns.

An ability and willingness to travel to all (or most) IPS Board Meetings at the Director's own expense is, by necessity, a strong consideration used by the Nominating Committee when selecting the names to go on the election ballot, as is email capability.

All Directors must be notified at least ten days in advance of Board Meetings. The Board meets at least once per year (at the Biennial and at Mid-term Directors Meetings). At each of these, Directors are usually tied up in business meetings (conducting the business of the society) for at least one full day. Sometimes additional Drectors' Meetings are required.

A quorum for all purposes shall be fifteen Directors. All actions of the Directors shall be by a majority of those present at a duly constituted meeting. Directors must be present in order to vote.

Fous de Palmiers The French Palm Society Second Semester 2000

As usual the summer months were calm but activities resumed in September. Our new correspondent for the Rhone-Alpes region, Emmnuel Vericel, met with other members at the Rare Plant Fair in Chatillon-sur-Chalaronne on September 10. Many were surprised to learn that Renaud de Looze grows his *Trachycarpus* in an Alpine valley, where they flourish with a backdrop of snow-capped mountains.

The following weekend, September 16-17, a group of 17 members met in southwesternmost France and admired public plantings of palms from Hendaye, on the French-Spanish border, where a beautiful specimen of Jubaea and several Butia capitata grow, to the spa town of Cambo Les Bains with splendid plantings, including recently imported Butia yatay, direct from South America. We also toured the private gardens of the Marce families (both father and son), Vincent Bardinet, Renée and Elizabeth Raux and also of Patrick Auriault and Christian Mazouz, near Bayonne. The passion to plant palms is contagious and emulation leads our members to plant profusely.

Le Palmier N° 24 came out in September. It included a lead article on palm fronds, as well as others relating the damage wrought by the end-of-year winter storm that devastated so much of France, the General Assembly excursion to Brittany, a new look at Phoenix theophrasti growing on the island of Crete and a "Fou" portrait.

A ten-hour flight from metropolitan France, the island of La Réunion was the site for the 2000 floral show of the Indian Ocean in early October, and Fous de Palmiers was represented. The local chapter, Palmeraie-Union, set up an award-winning display entitled "Palm Beach," (a souvenir of our trip to South Florida in 1999) with an impressive array of palms shown to the general public. Palmeraie-Union is officially supervising the creation of a vast

palm garden outside the town of Le Tampon. The tropical climate and volcanic soil are ideal for so many palms. Thierry Hubert, president, and his group are working hard to exploit the possibilities of La Réunion, when it comes to growing palms. We recommend a visit to anyone travelling in the Indian Ocean, since La Réunion, an overseas French department, is very near Madagascar.

Also in the beginning of October, the Fous of the Roussillon region met for their annual get-together in the home of Serge Gaillard at Pezilla La Rivière. More than 20 participated and shared notes, photos and a delightful meal together.

Mid-month was busy again southwestern France with a weekend visit in Aguitaine and Perigord. First stop was the palm nursery of Pascal Bernard, La Palmeraie, in Mios, near Arcachon, where visitors couldn't resist some "end of season" bargains. After that the next stop was "chez" Philippe and Françoise Larrue in their lovely hilltop garden overlooking the world-famous vineyards of Médoc. This autumn visit is becoming an annual event and each year the garden gets better as Philippe's collection grows and flourishes. It was only fitting that the day ended with a tour of a nearby "cave" of a Médoc château, located along the Gironde estuary and several members left with bottles of fine wine too.

The next day the scenery changed, inland from the Atlantic coast, through Bergerac (home of Cyrano!) and on to admire the bamboo collection of Mr. Bonfils in the town of Le Buisson. The last stop of the weekend was the cliff-side garden of La Roque Gageac, overlooking the Dordogne River. The village faces due south and the cliffs help to create the mild microclimate, where exotic vegetation seems to sprout literally out of the rocks. Participants enjoyed a farewell dinner in a restaurant, appropriately named Le Palmier.

Roussillon members headed south of the border to Barcelona, Spain on November 11. Destination – Montjuic Park, overlooking the port, literally filled with palms and cacti. The timing was perfect to harvest seeds to be offered through our seed bank.

We wound up our first year of quarterly publication with the December *Le Palmier N° 25*, just in time for the holidays. It included articles about the genus *Brahea*, the botanical garden of Perideniya in Sri-Lanka, the Mediterranean seaside town of St. Cyprien and its palms and a portrait of Julien

Marnier-Lapostolle, the collector and creator of the fabulous garden of the Villa Les Cèdres in St. Jean-Cap Ferrat, near Nice.

The AGM of the South Africa Palm Society

The next South African Palm Society Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held April 27 to 29 at the V&A lodge near Hartebeespoort Dam, near Pretoria. On the first day, we made an excursion to see some very interesting palm collections in Pretoria. Adrian van Rensen has a super collection with lots of different Chamedorea, Syagrus, Trachycarpus, Brahea, Livistona, Bismarckia, etc. His garden is also nicely landscaped. It was very interesting to see what can be grown in the Pretoria area. Most parts of the area receive regular light frosts, which limits the range of palms suitable for the area.

We enjoyed a very nice lunch at Mark Bradshaw's new house and the travel from there to his nursery, where he stocks a large range of palms and other plant. From there we proceeded to Meyer Palms. It was a most beautifully landscaped setup and was very impressive to see.

Johan and Louise van Rensen's Garden was the last one to be seen for the day. He has an interesting collection of *Syagrus*, *Trachycarpus* and other cold-hardy palms. Among them was a compact and very showy *Syagrus macrocarpa* specimen.

The guest speaker after dinner was Martin Gibbons. Martin is a former director of the International Palm Society and a leading researcher of the genus *Trachycarpus*. He gave us a talk and slideshow about the latest in *Trachycarpus*.

Saturday morning was the Annual General Meeting. One of the most important items for the new year will be to recruit new members for the Society as we have a small short fall of finances due to all issues of *The Palm Enthusiast* being in color print now.

For lunch, we traveled to Steve and Lelanie Trollip's farm to have lunch and a look at his collection. He also has a *Syagrus macrocarpa* holding 3 seeds, besides very nice *Brahea*, *Butia*, *Livistona* and other cold-hardy plants.

We had some very good fund raising from a Palm Raffle, sale of donated Wodyetia bifurcata seeds and a sale of Cycas schuhmaniana and Microcycas calocoma that were sold to members at very reasonable prices. Martin Gibbons gave us an excellent slide show of a collecting trip in Brazil.

On Sunday, there was a palm and fern sale held jointly with the Fern Society of South Africa.

Island of Hawaii Chapter

On March 23rd, Ken Foster led 22 members of the Hawaii Island Palm Society (HIPS) on a walking tour of two Hilo sites where interesting palms are planted. Per the Spring 2001 Pritchardia issue, "The tour began at Prince Kuhio Plaza, which has what must be some of the finest palm plantings of any shopping mall anywhere. Many Clinostigma, Ptychosperma, Areca. Archontophoenix purpurea, and at least one mystery Veitchia, grace the buildings and parking area." The next stop was the "Tree Nursery," or arboretum, on Kilauea Avenue. At that site, although marred by neglect and construction, is a collection of very interesting palms, some of them quite old. Among the most spectacular palms there is a very old Metroxylon amicarum. The group also saw a flowering Socratea sp. and fruiting Cryosophila stauracantha. One sad sight was the dead trunk of a once beautiful, mature Colpothrinax wrightii that was once one of the prize specimens at the arboretum. Per the Pritchardia write-up, "This relic

seemed emblematic of the low regard in which the custodians of the property view the palm collection."

A major palm planting was held on April 7th at Hilo's Panaewa Zoo. Several areas of the zoo had been previously cleared of "trash trees" and made ready for the plantings. HIPS representatives met with zoo staff and determined which areas should be planted and the best palms for those areas. It was decided to extend the original planting of 26 Wodyetia bifurcata by seven and add 33 across the street from the original planting. HIPS and zoo staff also "decided to plant 23 Arenga undulatifolia behind the long row of aviaries, to soften the fence line and add a lush, tropical appearance to the area. The final planting was to be a group of Dypsis leptocheilos (teddy bear palm) in front of the zoo office." HIPS obtained a grant from the Kaulunani Urban Forestry Program to fund purchase of these plants from local nurseries. On March 30th, Dean Piercy led seven inmates of the Hawaii Community Correctional Center (arranged by zoo staff) in clearing the land. It was amazing what a large crew could do in a few hours.

With donations from the Kiwanis Club, Hawaii County, Hawaii Paradise Exotics Nursery, and local palm society members – in addition to the 69 purchased with the grant, made 102 holes to be dug and 102 palms to be planted. Groups of volunteers brought the palms in on April 4th and, in cooperation with zoo staff, planted many of these on April 5th and 6th. On April 7th (the "official" planting day), the 31 volunteers planted the 40 Wodyetia bifurcata and 23 Arenga undulatifolia under a threat of rain. A number of donated plants were potted up to hold for future plantings. Three hundred pounds of fertilizer were spread. Additional plantings were made several days later. Altogether, volunteers worked 176 hours preparing for the project and in actual planting. In addition to HIPS and zoo staff, Hawaii County and T & T Electric also donated time and equipment. "Funding from the Kaulunani Urban Forestry Program makes the project possible and inspires all of the above community effort."

A Botanical Exposition and Plant Sale was held at the zoo on May 19th, when the zoo's bamboo collection was formally introduced to the public.

On May 19-20, Ray Baker, of Lyon Arboretum, led a grand tour of three

botanical gardens of Oahu: Lyons, Foster Botanical Garden and Ho'omaluhia Botanic Garden on this 2-day HIPS field trip. Members were able to see hundreds of mature rare palm species. See the Spring 2001 *Pritchardia* issue for articles summarizing the significant palms growing in these three gardens, as well as similar information on other Oahu botanic gardens not visited on the tour, due to time constraints.

HIPS will hold a Potluck and Tailgate Palm Sale on June 24th, at the Lundkvist residence in Leilani Estates.

Future events planned by HIPS for this year also include:

Palm Society of Southern California Chapter News

PSSC President, Dave Minks, reports that the financial state of the society is excellent. Dave reports, among other items, that the PSSC Board has approved \$1,500 in donations to encourage plantings of palms and that local society membership has increased to 800 members as of November.

The Palm Society of Southern California met on March 31st in the South Orange County. The Society visited two very different gardens: one mature and one young; one shady and protected while the other was bright and open, *etc*. Members were able to to see and enjoy widely diverging approaches and environments.

Our hosts Lynn and Juanita Muir of Dana Point showed us their collection that has been evolving since the 1970's - a stuffed to decidedly mature garden, overflowing with every conceivable palm. Lynn has been an IPS and PSSC member for many years and at one time ran the Seedbank for the IPS. He still has the enthusiasm of a new member, gladly pointing out interesting features. Lynn's garden is cool and shady, protected by much canopy. It has a very narrow temperature range of 40-80°F. He can grow Pinanga and Ptychosperma with ease. But the downside is that his Brahea are in slow motion and his beautiful ribboncandy Allagoptera arenaria is in pause mode, flowering but never able to set seed. I foolishly asked if the 7-foot palm in the front with its wide, yellowish leaves was a Chambeyronia macrocarpa? It was Kentiopsis oliviformis! Right island (New Caledonia) but wrong hillside. So palms do look different than you expect, depending on the climate and other factors.

The next stop was at the young garden of David and Andriette Culbertson of San Juan Capistrano, who provided room for our Board meeting and a huge patio where we held our renowned 50-50 palm auction. As usual, our growers brought superior palms and they sold at landscape palm levels (translation: very inexpensive). For such a short period, less than two years, there has been remarkable growth and development of these palms. The Culbertson's have a wonderful mix of deep green grass, fruit trees, special flowering plants and, lastly, palms. The open feeling of this garden, perched on a mesa overlooking San Juan Capistrano, is quite special.

Randal "Randy" Moore steps in as our new Treasurer. Walt Frey, an eleven year veteran as Membership/Back Issue Chairperson has resigned, and Alaric Prince will serve as the new Back Issue Chairperson.

The Society has a Palm and Cycad Sale scheduled for May 26th at Quail Botanical Garden in San Diego County. The first speaker at the event will be Lyle Arnold, discussing "Palms of New Caledonia and the 2000 I.P.S. Biennial in New Caledonia." This would be followed by casual tours of the garden. [Further details not available at press-time for this issue.]

The July meeting is planned for Gunther Schwartz's large and incredible Santa

Barbara garden, featuring a potluck meal. The last meeting at Gunther's in 1997 was a huge success for all who attended. Hopefully, this year will be even more enjoyable.

municipal building. The city has approved matching funds to pay for installation and maintenance. SPEPS will receive recognition for its involvement through a sign placed at the building.

In addition, SPEPS members formally recognized the effort of Alan Bills, who as **SPEPS** newsletter of the Editor Rhapidophyllum for several years, contributed greatly to its maturity as a recognized source of information on coldhardy palms and as a quarterly journal of the SPEPS. Alan was presented with a gift certificate to a plant nursery.

George and Judy Phillips, near Madison, GA, hosted the spring meeting of the SPEPS on April 21, 2001. We will have more about this meeting in the next issue.
