Final Call for Nominations to the Board of Directors of the International Palm Society

The International Palm Society is soliciting nominations for the Board of Directors for the directors' term 2002 to 2006. The election will be in the summer of 2002, but nominations <u>must be received by DECEMBER 15, 2001</u> to allow for ballot distribution with the March 2002, *PALMS*.

If interested in nominating someone (or in being nominated) to the Board of Directors, you must contact Sue Rowlands, Nominating Committee Chairman, and/or Libby Besse, the Administrative Secretary.

Nomination procedures and requirements (as stated in our by-laws.): All members in good standing may propose candidates for nomination by writing to the Administrative Secretary of the Society. A nomination must be accompanied by the written consent of the proposed candidate to serve if nominated by the committee and elected by the membership. This must be accompanied or followed by a second nomination from another member in good standing. Required documentation should be sent prior to December 15th by email or regular mail to the Administrative Secretary, Libby Besse with a copy to Sue Rowlands, Nominations Committee Chairman.

A member of the Society must be in good standing for two years before being nominated as a director. The Editors and Bookstore chairman are automatically on the board of directors, as is an outgoing President (for 2 years).

Nominating Committee Ballot and Election Guidelines: Directors are elected for a four-year term, with terms staggered so that approximately half the Directors shall be elected at each Biennial meeting. As stated in our by-laws "The Nominations Chairman will obtain from the Secretary a tally of membership according to regional distribution of members and use this as a guideline to obtaining and selecting representation worldwide." We are looking for qualified candidates to fill these positions who are willing to contribute to the success of the International Palm Society. Strong considerations are given to members with an

ability and willingness to travel to meetings and a demonstrated interest in the activities of the International Palm Society.

Based on the above guidelines and the number and qualifications of nominees, the Nominating Committee will prepare the slate of Nominees for Directors and the associated ballot to be sent with the March, 2002 issue of *Palms*. Each individual member who is voting must submit his or her own ballot.

There are up to 34 Directors on the Board of Directors. Fifteen will be elected this term. One of the three new members added to increase board participation from geographical areas with little or no representation will be added to Europe in hopes of broadening the representation from the many countries in that area. (Two positions from other areas of the world were added in the 2000 election.)

There will be directors' positions open in the following areas this election:

- Australia 1
- Southwestern USA 2
- Asia 1
- Hawaii and US Islands 2
- Europe 2
- Southeastern USA 4
- Canada & Northwest USA 1
- South Central USA 1
- Northeastern USA 1

The goal is to have several candidates for each board position, but this will depend on receipt of sufficient qualified nominations. We are looking for your input if you have a qualified candidate in mind.

Prospective directors should read carefully the Duties and Expectations of IPS Directors, which follow below.

Duties and Expectations: Information for Prospective IPS Directors:

The Directors have general charge and direction of the affairs and business of the Society, the care and management of the Society's funds and other property, with power to invest, reinvest and transfer the same at their discretion. Directors are expected to take an active role in these activities and serve on appropriate committees set up to concentrate on specific tasks or concerns.

The Board of Directors shall consist of up to thirty-four members, including Officers. Newly elected Officers and Directors take office immediately after the close of the Biennial meeting at which they were elected; i.e., the first meeting held at the 2002 Biennial. A meeting of the new Board of Directors will then be held for the approval of newly appointed committees and other new business. Newly elected Officers and Directors are also invited to observe at the last meeting of their predecessors.

The board meets at least once per year (at the Biennial and Mid-Term Directors meetings). At each of these, Directors are usually tied up in business meetings (conducting the business of the society) for at least one full day. Sometimes additional directors meetings are required.

If Officers or Directors are removed for cause including inattention to the conduct of the Society's affairs or general ineptitude, the vacancies or vacancy so occurring shall be filled by a majority vote of the Directors at their next meeting for the unexpired term of such removed Officers or Directors. This includes members dropped for non-payment of dues.

There shall be an Executive Committee of the Board of Directors. It shall serve at the call of the President and/or Vice-President, who shall serve as Chairman. There shall be at least four other Directors, who shall be appointed from time to time by the President and/or Vice-President. All Directors shall be notified of all Executive Committee meetings and any Director attending shall also be a member of the Executive Committee for that meeting. The minutes and decisions reached and actions recommended at such meeting shall be circulated to non-attending Directors for their approval or disapproval. This is currently done by email to most Directors, with a very few distributed by regular mail or fax. Approval by a sufficient number of Directors which, when added to the number serving on the Executive committee at any meeting, and which constitutes a majority of the Board, shall "render actions of the Committee of the same force and effect as actions taken by the full Board of Directors at a duly conducted meeting

Fous de Palmiers The French Palm Society

Throughout France we enjoyed one of the mildest, albeit humid, winters on record. It is often a season we dread but most of our members reported little or no damage to their palms, even in northern France.

The year started out with a get-together in the home of Pierre and Chantal Bianchi, who are correspondents for the association in Roussillon, that southernmost region of France along the Mediterranean, on the Spanish border. More than 20 members enjoyed a spring-like day (in Roussillon they described it as a "California winter") as they toured the garden and made plans for the upcoming year.

Next on the docket was a major plant show at Jacou, in the Herault, near Montpellier, up the coast but also along the Mediterranean, the weekend of February 9. 10 and 11. The theme this year was orchids and tropicals surrounding ... palms! Among the highlights of the show were the conferences: Pierre-Olivier Albano gave a talk and slide show on tropical palms the first day and the second day he dealt with hardy palms for local gardens, while the last day Valérie Hocher described palms of economic importance. Each of the conferences was well attended and press afterwards releases were full compliments.

Things really got rolling in March. The weekend of March 10 and 11 Antoine de Tata was in charge of a stand at the plant fair of the Côte Bleue, near Marseille. Thanks to stands such as these more and more people are inspired to plant palms in places not normally associated with them. That same weekend 29 members met at the opposite corner of France, in Nantes, along the northern Atlantic coast, invited by Claire and Jamal Ouagazzal. Nantes, as a seaport, was the site of many plant introductions from former French colonies. The day started off with a visit to the hotel of Mr. and Mrs. Moulet, Westotel, who were kind enough to guide members through their veritable palm

grove not only surrounding but also inside the hotel, where tropical specimens are planted. After that the group headed to the botanical garden to admire the *Trachycarpus* grove and the fabulous palmarum, a greenhouse over 200 years old, the cactus greenhouse and the orangerie. The last stop of the day was to the park, the Grand Blottereau, where the colonial school of botany was transferred around 1950. Here Marc Mansuis guided the visitors for this highlight of the day. The last event of the month was in Roussillon for a plant fair at Ille sur Têt. This included a slide show and talk by Pierre Bianchi, comparing commonly planted palms to other species, just as hardy but rarely used in gardens here.

Le Palmier N° 26 appeared in March, articles about the species including Washingtonia in Roussillon, a portrait of Robert Fortune, the Scottish botanist whom thank for introducing have to Trachycarpus to Europe, a new description of a visit to Florida by one of our members, the story of the transplantation of four adult palms, two Washingtonia and two Jubaea, destined for destruction if they were not moved and finally a portrait of one of our members. When sending out our magazine we also send out ballots to elect our new Board of Directors, which we do by mail, making it possible for a maximum of our members to vote and, at the same time, invitations were sent out for our annual General Assembly.

Southeastern members met at the beginning of April for a day of visits in Monaco, led by Eric Vermiglio. IPS members coming for the Biennial next year in France will have an opportunity to visit the beautiful gardens here, from those surrounding the casino to the new gardens on the waterfront, on land reclaimed from the Mediterranean. In Monaco land is at a premium and the only way to expand is up, as evidenced by the skyscrapers here or ... out to sea! The weekend of April 21 and 22 Antoine de Tata again welcomed visitors to the plant show at the Cours Julien in Marseille.

The following long holiday weekend, April 27 through May 1, we met in Uzès in the Gard for our annual General Assembly. The results of the election for our Board of Directors and officers were announced (see *Supplement* to *Palms*, Vol. 45(2) June 2001). The festivities included guided tours of Uzès (a lovely and perfectly restored

medieval town), the annual Festival des Jardins, a visit to a nursery between Nîmes and Montpellier nearby, a dinner that included a magic show put together by Antoine de Tata and his grandson, a photography exhibition with the work of Françoise Maunoury, conferences by Pierre-Olivier Albano, Jean-Christophe Pintaud, Patrice Fauchier and renowned botanist Jean-Marie Pelt, a visit to the Bambouseraie of Anduze (a collection of hardy bamboos growing in a grove planted over 100 years ago) and, last but not least, a guided tour of the Pont du Gard, an aqueduct dating back to the Romans, near Uzès. It was a memorable weekend and we made plans to meet next vear in Roussillon for our next General Assembly.

May was the busiest month of all, with plant shows and fairs all over the country. Jean Gourier and Jean-Pierre Gadiollet were present at stands in Brest and Quimper in Brittany while Patrice Fauchier gave a conference at the Horticulture and Arborist Society of the Bouches du Rhone. Dominique Cordonnier organized a plant fair in the Pyrénées Orientales where Catherine Lelievre welcomed the Fous and the general public and answered countless On May 12 questions about palms. Emmanuel Vericel organized a tour of palms in and around Lyon. On that day Christian Rimbaud guided members through the greenhouse of the park of la Tête d'Or while Mr. and Mrs. Pigeot opened their garden in Rillieux la Pape, set on a hillside overlooking the city of Lyon, the Rhône river and the Alps in the distance. The two annual plant fairs at the château de Gaujacq in southwestern France and at the château de Courson near Paris drew crowds again this vear.

In June, Christiane and Jean-Michel Hardy welcomed visitors to their lovely garden near the Atlantic coast graced cordylines, cycads, banana plants and a fine collection of palms.

Palms had great press during the course of the spring with national coverage on television and radio and numerous articles in the press, including the magazines *Détente Jardin, Rustica, Horticulture et Paysage Magazine* and the *Lien Horticole*. And our Internet site enjoys growing popularity with both members and the general public as more and more people in France become "branchés" (hooked up)!

We rounded up the semester with the publication of Le Palmier N°27, an issue in which the Butia capitata x Syagrus romanzoffiana hybrid is highlighted. includes a portrait of Gilbert Nabonnand, the Frenchman who, during the 19th century, was among the first to intentionally hybridise this beautiful palm in his nursery on the Riviera, translations of two articles by Dr. Wilcox, relating his work in producing this hybrid in Florida and the sighting of some up until now unknown specimens growing in a garden between Cannes and Nice. The last article is a detailed account of the Fous de Palmiers trip to Morocco in February to visit the palm groves there.
