For the meeting on February 26th, PACSOWA was very fortunate to have Ian Crombie, Curator of Horticulture at Perth Zoo as guest speaker. Perth Zoo has the best mature palm garden in Perth and it deserves to be seen as a botanic garden. There are at least fifty species of palms present, ranging from 100 years old to only recently planted. Ian's presentation provided insights about the place, of their plans as well as their history. PACSOWA President, Gary Pike, gave a short talk about the myriad uses of palms and their products. There are many, more than most people realize. Frank Bancroft arranged raffle prizes for this including nice specimens of Rhopalostylis baueri, Rhopalostylis sapida, Zamia furfuracea, Chamaedorea oblongata, a C. costaricana and a genuine (from Indian seed) Phoenix rupicola.

The Society has scheduled a bus trip for March 17<sup>th</sup>, with tours of three beautiful palm gardens in the northern suburbs. First is Phil Loffman's place in City Beach, this was one of the early palm gardens of Perth, and now contains mature palms of many species. ## Fous de Palmiers The French Palm Society Second Semester 2001

After the typical summer lull, when many of our members take off on vacation trips, activities resumed with an extremely busy month in September. Claire and Jamal Ouagazzal set up a stand at the Grand Blottereau Plant Fair the weekend of September 8 and 9 in the Atlantic port city of Nantes. That same weekend Manu Vericel and Martial Piret welcomed members and visitors to the Rare Plant Fair in Chatillon sur Chalaronnne while our new

correspondent in northeastern France, Daniel Pfister, invited members there for their first rendezvous at his home in the suburbs of Strasbourg.

The following weekend was the annual visit of the gardens of the Villa Les Cèdres (one of the many Riviera gardens to be visited during this year's biennial in France in September) while members from western France got together for a two-day visit organized by Patrick and Hélène Bourraine to the coastal islands of Ré and Oloron, near La Rochelle. On September 23, thanks to correspondent Serge Dassain, about thirty members met in Toulouse to visit gardens there as well as a nearby palm nursery.

The last weekend of September Christian and Nicole Figa welcomed members from Roussillon, near the Spanish border, for the annual regional meeting.

Le Palmier N° 28 was published, featuring articles about the palms of the island of Mayotte, in the Indian Ocean, palm fruit with irritant properties, palms in Bordeaux, a portrait of one of our members and the conclusion of the article concerning Washingtonia growing in Roussillon.

Hawaii Island Palm Society events over the past year included the following:

Botanical exposition and plant sale at the Panaewa Rain Forest Zoo: This was a big deal at the zoo, with lots of the general public attending. We had a booth at this event and Ken Foster (I believe) led a tour of the palm plantings there. We've planted a ton of stuff there, and a lot of it is reaching maturity and attaining real stature.

Between 30 and 40 members attended the First Annual Potluck and Tailgate Palm Sale, June 24, held at Bo and Karolyn Lundkvist's place in Leilani Estates. There was lots of great food and palm talk, and an informal sale—right out of the truck, you might say—on the road just outside Bo and Karolyn's place. Bargain hunters prevailed.

In August, we held a field trip to Palms of Paradise, with a large group of us touring this nursery. The tour focused on the mature plantings outside the nursery, because Palms of Paradise no longer produces many rare and interesting palms for sale. We did go inside the immense shade houses, however and saw a few gems among the common, commercial stock.

On September 23<sup>rd</sup>, we held a very enlightening Field Trip to the Sadie Seymour Botanical Gardens. About twenty people attended this meeting – good attendance for a meeting on the Kona side of the island, where only a small percentage of our membership lives. The gardens themselves are notable for their beauty and their mix of native Hawaiian plants of ethnobotanical significance. It is a small garden, and while palms are not the main attraction, it was a pleasure to visit.

Dr. Greg Koob, Ph.D., former micropropagation specialist for the Arboretum and presently working for the USDA Department of Fish and Wildlife, gave a slide presentation on embryo-rescue of Pritchardia. Afterward, the group worked of Pritchardia schattaueri seed provided by the presenter, who collected it at the National Tropical Botanical Garden Kauai. This allowed attendees experience finding and "rescuing" embryo for themselves.

Dr. Koob developed the technique for Pritchardia embryo rescue after reading an article on the embryo rescue of African Oil Palms in *Principes* (now *Palms*). He found that *Pritchardia* can be grown from green seed as long as the fruit has reached 2/3 of its mature size (i.e. can be picked before the rats get them) in a dish at a growth rate faster than a container grown seed. The technique does not require a laboratory. This presentation was very interesting. The heart of the technique is to collect the seed, then in a lab or other sanitary place open it and extract the embryo, which is then placed in a nutrient-rich agar medium. The embryo thinks it is still in the seed, takes its nutrients from the agar and germinates normally. Such immature seed, if collected, would rot, but the sterile agar gel circumvents this problem. You can imagine what a boon this technique would be for palm hunters in the wild looking up at a clump of almost-mature seed.

The Ray Baker slide show on October  $26^{th}\ was\ a\ fascinating\ and\ different\ slide$ Ray used two projectors, and he showed slides of parts of palms, and had two slides on the screen at any given time, so that could show differences in crownshafts, between two different palms. Ray had a very extensive collection of slides showing trunks, crownshafts, inflorescences, seeds, fronds, petioles, etc. Attendees thoroughly enjoyed this very professional and entertaining, presentation. Ray is the curator of palms at Lyon Arboretum and is probably one of Hawaii's knowledgeable experts on palms, as well as being a very entertaining speaker.

A large group of members toured the plantings at the zoo on November 11th. Some of the palms, such as the *Bismarckia nobilis* and *Marojejya* are real knockouts. The *Mauritiella armata* are becoming standouts, too. The Caroline ivory nut palms, *Metroxylon amicarum* are getting some stature now and may be forming trunk—it's hard to tell in the dense area where they are planted.

The *Supplement* to *Palms (formerly Principes)* is always looking for additional news input from or about local palm enthusiasts around the world. #### Biographical Information on Candidates for IPS Board of Director Positions.

Phil Bergman has been a member of the IPS for 25 years. He served as the IPS President from 1996 to 2000. Phil has been instrumental in furthering International Chapter participation, communications and membership in the IPS, and was instrumental in bringing us the Biennials in Thailand and New Caledonia. Phil was the President of the Southern California Palm Society for four years and has been the San Diego Area Chairman for over ten years. He has authored many articles for the *Palm Journal* and *Palms* (formerly *Principes*) and has traveled extensively in his quest to learn more about palms. He owns Jungle Music, a palm and cycad nursery in San Diego, California.

Norman Bezona is a University of Hawaii Agricultural Extension agent with responsibilities in ornamental horticulture, forestry, and environmental studies. He has been a member of the IPS since 1961 and was active in the Society in Florida before moving to the "Volcano Island" of Hawaii where he lives on 60 acres of montane cloud forest. His gardens serve as a classroom for local students, residents and tourist groups who wish to learn about native and exotic plant species. He writes many articles about palms for newspapers and publications. Norm is one of the founders of the Hawaii Island Palm Society and has remained an active member.

Faith Fessenden Bishock fell in love with palms after buying her first house in Coral Gables from an elderly palm grower. She then joined Fairchild Gardens and began her study of palms. He has been deeply involved in a project of researching, testing and growing more species for cold hardiness and has come up with some unexpected surprises

Horace Hobbs is a marketing executive for a petroleum products pipeline company. He is a chemical engineer by training and has spent most of his career as an international consultant providing strategic planning services for oil companies. He has served on the IPS Board of Directors since 1994. He was elected IPS President at the New Caledonian biennial meeting in 2001 and had previously served two terms as Vice President. He has been active in the Houston, Texas area Chapter of the IPS where he served as president for several years. He and his wife Cynthia maintain a palm garden in Houston and travel extensively in search of palms and other tropical plants.

Bo-Göran Lundkvist has held a general interest in palms and other tropical plants all his life. Bo joined the IPS and the Southern California chapter in 1991 and served as Editor of *The Palm Journal* in 1993-1994. He has also served on the IPS Board of Directors since June 1994. Toby has also authored and co-authored numerous articles in *Principes* (now *Palms*), *The Palm Journal*, and *Chamaerops*, and has been featured in radio and television interviews, and in several German gardening magazines. Toby owns a nursery in Munich, Germany, and distributes seeds to over 75 countries.

Kampon Tansacha of Thailand has been involved with growing plants in Southeast Asia for many, many years. Kampon has developed extensive palm gardens and a Thai cultural center, an area of almost 500 acres, at Nong Nooch, Pattaya, Thailand. Kampon hosted the 1998 Biennial that was attended by over 200 participants. Kampon has been a member of the IPS Board for the past four years. He has actively supported the IPS and many other plant societies for many years.

Natalie Uhl, a well-known systematic plant anatomist and morphologist, is an associate professor in the L. H. Bailey Hortorium of Cornell University. She is the co-author of *Genera Palmarum* and was the co-editor of the IPS journal, *Principes*, from 1980 to 2000. Natalie has been a Director of the International Palm Society for more than 18 years and during that period actively supported the IPS expansion and growth.
