News from the Sydney Branch (PACSOA) IPS Chapter

The Sydney Branch (PACSOA) has a new President and a new Editor for 2002: Steve Tornquist is the new President and Ian Edwards has assumed the position of Editor.

At the March 26th meeting, Pat Houlcroft told about how the Royal Botanic Gardens management has become more aware of environmental responsibilities. They are now composting rather than removing green waste, minimizing use of chemicals (even if that means forgetting about the Azaleas!), controlling the wildlife (Ibis fairly easily, flying foxes still a problem), etc. Palms distributed at the auction included Basselinia gracilis. Chamaedorea glaucifolia (seedlings), C. metallica (seedlings), С. deckeriana (seedlings), C. cataractarum (large plant) and Euterpe edulis. There were also several cycads and other plants in the auction: Bowenia serrulata (three plants), Ceratozamia latifolia, Macrozamia moorei

and Zamia splendens, Alocasia sp. "Jungle Green", Ataenidia conferta, Calathea coccinea, Costus speciosus "variegata", Heliconia subulata, Tapeinochilos queenslandiae and Zingiber ottensii.

Mike Gray spoke on May 28th about "Three Joeys, and a *Pinanga*" (as well as several *Salacca*, *Licuala* and other assorted palms). He brought tales of excitement and adventure, describing palm hunting through Sumatra, Malaya, and Borneo. Mike is the PACSOA webmaster and is also now Editor of the Newsletter for the Southern Queensland Group of PACSOA.

The July issue of *Principes Minor* will be a magazine featuring the cycad Genus *Lepidozamia*. Many in the Sydney area have *L. peroffskyana*, which is after all a NSW species, and *L. hopei* also grows well there.

An outing was held to the home of Paul and Anne Anderson, Poole Close, Empire Bay. The group had a fine day for their visit, just before the rain set in again.

Ian and Peter Kristensen also report that the Cabbage Tree (Livistona) palms at Bass & Flinders Point, Cronulla, which the Society planted more than four years ago, are coming along well. They were recently weeded and fertilized by various members of the Kristensen, Edwards and Thompson families. [The IPS contributed two nice signs for this project through an IPS Endowment Fund grant.]

The South Australian Branch (PACSOSA) of PACSOA has provided information on their late 2000 and 2001 activities. Here is a recap.

On November 26, 2000, approximately sixty members of PACSOSA, Friends of the

Waite Arboretum and their guests attended the opening ceremony for the Heinz Froehlingsdorf Palm and Cycad Trail at the Waite Arboretum. This was an unexpected but great honor for Heinz-Dieter, longstanding and founding member of the South Australian society. Dr. Jennifer Gardener, Curator of the Waite Arboretum thanked all with emphasis on the PACSOSA efforts on behalf of the Arboretum. PACSOSA President Max Bawden then provided additional information on the local Society and how the trail fit the needs and aims of the society. Max handed over to Anthony (Tony) Brady, founding President of PACSOSA who unveiled the plaque and Tony then officially opened the trail. handed over to Heinz who expressed his appreciation for the honor and for all the help put forth by the Waite watercourse beautification project over the past six years. Heinz then conducted a tour of the trail. Currently there are about 200 palms and 20 cycads planted there.

The PACSOSA 10th Anniversary Christmas Break-up Show was hosted by Dean and Mardi Hoy with about 20 members and guests in attendance. The weather was perfect for the event. Palm highlights included excellent specimens of *Dictyosperma album* (Princess Palm) and a *Wodyetia bifurcata* with a good-sized trunk. The raffle prize was a 3-meter (10-foot) *Dypsis decaryi* (Triangle Palm) won by Tracy Geiltowski.

A field trip was made on March 11th to the southern suburbs of Adelaide and the McLaren Vale wine area. First stop was the well-known Fern Forest Nursery near Willunga, where members were able to view the palm and cycad collection. The Fern Forest is actually divided into two primary sections: the nursery (with conservatory plantation) and the actual forest. Key palms in the conservatory area included mature specimens of Lytocaryum weddellianum (Wedding Palm), advanced plants of Rhopalostylis baueri, R. sapida and a large solitary trunked Caryota species. Highlight palms in the Forest area included extensive plantings of Archontophoenix alexandrae, Hedvscepe cunninghamiana, Α. canterburyana and a large single specimen of a strikingly blue Bismarckia nobilis. The next schedules stop was a home in Happy Valley with palm plantings of numerous species almost completely obscuring the house. Final destination on the tour was the home of Joanne and Steve Geyer, amidst many trees. Views from the house and garden were spectacular in the Stuart Gorge area. We ended the day with a barbecue.

The PACSOSA AGM and "busy bee" were held at Waite Arboretum on April 29th. After the AGM, there was a general tidy-up and additional palms were planted. Palms planted included 2 X Arenga engleri, 1 X Brahea decumbens, 5 X Chamaedorea costaricana, 5 X C. oblongata, 5 X C. tepejilote, 5 X C. woodsoniana, 2 X C. metallica, 1 X Dypsis decipiens, 1 X D. leptocheilos, and 1 X Wallichia densiflora,

A visit to the Adelaide Botanic Garden was held on July 8th to view the new plantings and see how the older plants are performing.

A Waite Arboretum "Busy Bee" was held on November 24th to repair signs, mulch, fertilize and so some replacement plantings and general tidy up. Another "Busy Bee" was held on April 25th, ANZAC day with more plantings and clean up.

The 2001 Christmas Party and Breakup was held on December 2nd. The day started with visits to various palm and cycad locations in the western suburbs of Adelaide. The group then visited the garden of Henry and Krys Polec in West Lakes to see some excellent palm and cycad specimens. The home of Noel and Rosemary Richards at Royal Park was the last stop where the BBQ Tea was held, followed by a plant sale.

Palm & Cycad Society of Western Australia News

The Palm & Cycad Society of Western Australia (PACSOWA) met on March 27th for a presentation by John Banasiewicz on Cycads (in particular the genera *Ceratozamia*, *Zamia* and *Bowenia*.) Several rare or unusual palms were brought in for discussion and/or identification. Among palms brought in were:

- Satakentia liukiuensis (a very attractive palm that is native to the Ryukyu Islands, south of Japan),
- Aiphanes aculeata (an unusual-looking palm from the rainforests of South

America with broad leaflets covered with ferocious spines (trunk, petioles and all over the leaves as well)

- Pinanga sp., tropical palms from Southeast Asia, primarily smallish suckering palms, often with bright colored new leaves.
- Chamaedorea oblongata, a solitary species with lovely dark green glossy leaves which are heavily dimpled, it is easy to grow in Western Australia.

Darryl Hardie, a longtime member of the Society and our resident entomologist spoke at the April 23rd meeting about Palm Pests updating members on the "various hideous creepy crawlies that can strip our precious palms bare." Following on from Ken Adcock's recent talk about the founding of our Society and its early days, Norm Patterson, who has also been a member since the first meeting in 1985, told more about the early days and his introduction into the exotic world of palms and cycads.

Long-time Society member and our annual palm and cycad auctioneer Russell Dyer was recently featured in the *Sunday Times*. There was a large photo showing some of his magnificent palms and cycads. Russell "listed his favorite things, got described as a tropical garden expert and gave our Society a plug, he also got a mention for his presentation at the University of W. A. extension, *Make Your Garden a Tropical Retreat*."

A "Busy Bee" was held on February 24th. A well-numbered crowd was there ready for action. Those in attendance were Ian Judge, Patricia and Erling Anda, Ken Lee, Tony Bowyer, John and Joy Banasiewicz, Steve Warren, George Sevastos, and a big welcome to Ken Adcock, our Past-President and Karel Hartlieb, our current Treasurer. Much pruning, fertilizing, weeding and planting was accomplished. All in all 37 palms and cycads were planted:

The Houston (Texas) Area Chapter of the International Palm Society met at the Houston Zoo on March 16th to hear a very interesting presentation on the genus *Brahea*, by Fred Boutin of Tuolumne, California. Members were free to tour the zoo following the presentation and snacks.

Tony's Dallas Garden boasts an exotic tropical atmosphere but features plants that are also cold hardy. The garden of Peter and Julie Schaar is "basically a Mexican courtyard with a terrace instead of a lawn." Various trees. shrubs, vines, roses and herbs perfume the garden, which includes tropical plants such as palm, agave, yucca and oleander. At Judy Fender's wildlife garden, three water gardens, waterfalls and a 46-foot stream were among the highlights. Texas Discovery Gardens vice president Michael Cheever had several unusual plants. The garden variety was rounded out with David and Julie Rolston's English landscape garden, Barbara Einspruch's semiformal garden featuring

ornamental grasses; and Doyle and Donna Terry's Hill Country garden

Earlier this year, Tony had led a group deep into the Palmetto Alligator Slough Preserve south of downtown Dallas to view an unusual native stand of *Sabal minor*. These dwarf palmettos are unusually tall, growing to an average of eight feet in height, with a few as tall as twelve feet.
