At the May 2002 meeting, Will Kraa spoke briefly on factors helpful in getting tender palms through winter. This included care about nutrition. with reduced nitrogenous components and increased potassium. Watering needs to be continued and the roots kept as warm as possible as otherwise available nutrients are not taken up. Plants may do badly when the air temperature starts to rise in spring as the roots may still cold and not taking either water or nutrients. Mulching is a key way to keep soil temperature up. Plants should be protected from cold winds that tend to dehydrate the plant even when soil moisture is adequate. Spraying with 'Envy' or 'Wilt protect leaves from water loss. Spraying with micronutrients in early spring is also beneficial. John Meulet gave a presentation on the major botanical features of palms, followed by a quiz that generated a nice door prize to Lou Randall.

The raffle was a resounding success, Along with the beautiful *Ptychosperma* sp. "Wotu Bohu" and *Ceratozamia hildae* provided by the Society, members brought in a large number of additional plants.

The July 16th meeting focused on Fire Ant control and a regulations talk by the Department of Primary Industries. This was followed by a showing of the very beautiful and informative video of the Palms of New Caledonia.

An outing was held on August 18th to Utopia! Teresa and Clayton York have an amazing collection! Tour was followed by BYO lunch and plant purchase.

The September 17th meeting will feature Dr. Hugh Kunze sharing some of the really awesome spectacles of Sarawak and its palm flora (minus leaches and pouring rain!)
