Palmtalk Receives an Upgrade

On January 24, 2003, the IPS interactive message board received a major upgrade. The new forum is considerably different than before, for several reasons.

Anyone may view the new forum, but participating requires a one-time, free registration and a valid email address. Participants may elect to keep their email addresses hidden from public view while enjoying the benefits of "tracking a topic," similar to the email notification feature of the old format. The forum also has a private messenger system, which allows person-toperson correspondence. These are the more robust new features of the forum.

The new forum allows attributes not previously available, such as bold, italics, underlines, and color choices for text. Emoticons, a.k.a. "smilies," are also available to add more personality. The much-requested feature of being able to edit a post is now also available.

While the new format has more bells and whistles than before, several participants lamented the demise of the old format. The forum ran on an even keel for many years where people could post freely. Some likened it to the friendly neighborhood pub where anyone could pop in and chat about palms amicably. This was indeed the case for a long time.

Many participants liked the email notification feature, which required a valid email address to utilize. Spammers took advantage of those addresses by using "email harvester" programs to collect email addresses for the purpose of sending UCE (unsolicited commercial email, a.k.a. spam). Providing protection to our participants while preserving a favorite feature was an important consideration in the upgrade process.

increasing Spam is an ever pervasive problem on the Internet. Even worse, spammers began posting noxious messages in the Palmtalk forum last August. Evidently, filling our mailboxes with unwanted correspondence is not enough. Now they target forums too. Their messages were promptly removed, followed by In the past, people filtering techniques. imposing undesirable elements on the forum have been intermittent and temporary. Unfortunately, temporary cannot be used to describe a situation that lasts six months, and intermittent cannot be used to describe something that happens daily.

A substantially different format was chosen to remedy the spam and other abuses occurring in the forum, and so far the success has been outstanding. In less than three weeks, the forum has over 200 registered participants and over 1,000 messages. And best of all, not one piece of spam! The address got a bit longer, but to keep things simple, the easiest way to get through the old address: there is www.palms.org/palmtalk/

2004 Biennial News from Hawaii

The Hawaii Island Palm Society (HIPS) will host the Biennial and Post Tour events for the year 2004. Registration packets will be included with the September issue of Palms.

Itinerary details are subject to change, but the following is a rough outline of proposed events. More details will be available in the June **Supplement**.

Biennial 2004: Saturday, May 8th: Members of the Board of Directors arrive in Honolulu. Sunday, May 9th: the IPS Board of Directors will meet. All attendees should arrive in Honolulu and register at the Pacific Beach Hotel in time for the Welcome Dinner, which will officially open the Biennial the evening of the 9th.

Monday, May 10th: we will visit Lyon Arboretum in Manoa Valley. Among the palms not to be missed are four massive *Corypha umbraculifera* that could be from Jurassic Park. Lyon Arboretum has over 600 palm species, some 80 years old.

Tuesday, May 11th: we will visit Wahiawa Botanical Garden. cradled between the Waianae and Koolau mountain ranges in Central Oahu. This 27-acre garden and forested ravine dates back to 1920, when it was developed as an experimental arboretum. From Wahiawa we will continue to Oahu's famous surfing areas on the North Shore on our way to Waimea Falls Arboretum. At Waimea, over 100 genera are planted in groupings by tribe. We end the day at the Polynesian Cultural Center for dinner and see "Horizons," a revue of song and dance, featuring dancers from the Polynesian Islands, including Hawaii, Tonga, Tahiti and others.

Wednesday, May 12th: we leave Oahu after a visit to Ho'omaluhia Botanical Garden. These lush 400 acres on windward Oahu feature extensive plantings of palms from around the world, grouped geographically. That afternoon, we take a flight to Hilo on the "Big Island" of Hawaii, which has one of the premier palm-growing climates of the world.

Thursday, May 13th: busses will rotate between two very different palm gardens in rainforest settings in Leilani Estates and a garden in Kapoho on a lava flow near the ocean.

Friday, May 14th: busses will rotate between three private gardens in Puna and Waiakea areas and the Panaewa Rainforest Zoo, where the Hawaii Island Palm Society has planted over 100 species of palms.

Saturday, May 15th: the morning will be free to allow attendees to visit downtown Hilo to see the Farmer's Market, a glorious display of Hawaii grown flowers and produce; the Tsunami Museum; the Lyman Museum; to shop or see other points of interest. In the afternoon, we will take a scenic tour up the historic Hamakua Coast to see Akaka Falls and visit a private garden on the return to Hilo.

Sunday, May 16th will include a tour of Volcano National Park and the end of the biennial. All Post Tour attendees should be checked into the Hilo Hawaiian Hotel by the evening of May 16th.

<u>Post Tour:</u> Monday, May 17th: we will visit private gardens along the Hamakua coast's deep soil area, where rainfall averages over 100 inches per year. One garden is located on cliffs above the ocean.

Tuesday, May 18th: we bus over to the Kona side of the Big Island, stopping at points of interest along the way. Referred to as the "dry-side," Kona averages about 14 inches of rain per year. We will stay at the Keauhou Beach Resort, located on a beach that is great for snorkeling and viewing the endangered green sea turtles.

Wednesday, May 19th: after visiting three private gardens around Kona — one of which is in a higher elevation rainforest, we will take a flight to the island of Kauai.

Thursday, May 20th: we will visit the National Tropical Botanical Garden on Kauai, which includes both the Allerton Garden and the McBryde Garden. (See *Palms*, Vol. 44(3) 2000 issue for more information on the NTBG.) We plan to have lunch where the river meets the ocean at the garden. Our group will be touring areas of NTBG not normally open to the public.

Friday, May 21st: "Jungle Dan," a major palm grower and landscaper, is on our list of sites to visit. Other public gardens are still being explored. In late afternoon, the Post Tour will move to Honolulu.

Saturday, May 22nd will include a tour of the "grand old lady" of the Honolulu Botanical Gardens, Foster Botanical Garden. Located near busy downtown Honolulu, this 14-acre garden features trees that were planted in the 1850's. Their collection of mature palms is outstanding. We will also visit the 200-acre Koko Crater Botanical Garden, on the slopes and basin of Koko Crater at the eastern end of Oahu. Here we will see dry-land palms, including native *Pritchardia* species. Saturday evening will be the official end of the Post Tour.

Field trips not previously discussed in the Supplement include the following, written up by Rob Feyen of FNQPACA.

On May 19th, about 20 members and guests gathered at Rosebud Farm, the property of Rich Trapnell near Kuranda — also visited by the IPS 2000 PostTour delegates. This is a unique garden with a long history. Much time was spent staring in awe at the many huge *Corypha*, *Metroxylon* and *Pigafetta* species near the main buildings. An extraordinarily diverse place!

On July 28th, a small group traveled southwest of Innisfail to visit Paronella Park. Occasional showers accompanied the group. Begun in 1929 by Jose Paronella and completed in 1935, thirteen acres of rainforest contained a castle and grand staircase built in the Spanish style, as well as many other buildings, a swimming pool, a hydroelectric scheme, tennis courts, museum and a tunnel. Throughout the garden, Jose planted some 7,000 trees. Now listed as part of the National Trust, these gardens are now a major tourist attraction, with up to 600 visitors daily. After lunch, the group drove back to John and Chris Farringtons' garden on Harvey Creek near Bellenden Ker. All were amazed at what fifteen years of dedicated hard work can accomplish. Magnificent palms and a selection of tropical trees lined roads, pathways and garden beds.

Fous de Palmiers The French Palm Society Summary of First Semester 2002

This information from the *Fous de Palmiers* was prepared for an earlier issue, but was not published at that time due to Supplement Editor's "technical difficulties".

The Board of Directors met in February in Uzès and finalized plans for the IPS Biennial for September and made preparations for our General Assembly meeting in May in the Roussillon, the region of France on the French-Spanish border along the Mediterranean.

We started spring with the publication of *Le Palmier* N° 30, containing articles about palms in the Dominican Republic, about the Fous Internet site (www.chez.com/palmiers,) *Livistona chinensis* and other Japanese curiosities, *Paysandisia archon*, pest of ornamental palms and finally the palms of the southwestern French city of Toulouse.

In March members Michel Greco, Ivan Ducuing, Patrick Marty and Steve Swinscoe were in charge of a stand for the association at the plant fair in Sauvagnon, in the southwesternmost department of the Pyrénées Atlantiques. On a beautiful spring day in a spot with a view of the snow-covered mountains to the south, the border between France and Spain, they informed the general public about palms with some nice nearby specimens of *Trachycarpus*.

Activities in April included a visit of the gardens of the city of Menton, on the southeasternmost border of France with Italy, overlooking the Mediterranean. organized by our local correspondent Gérald The next weekend, April 13, Martinez. François Woelffel, Parisian correspondent, organized a visit to the greenhouses of Auteuil and the Luxembourg gardens in the capital, while Antoine de Tata represented the association at a plant fair in Marseilles. The last weekend of the correspondent Jamal Ouagazzal welcomed almost 30 members for two days of visits in and around the city of Nantes, near the Atlantic coast. central The private collections of Monsieur and Madame Bellard, Thierry and Vivianne Barjolle and François Jeanneau were on the program, as well as public gardens in the city.

On May 1st, Jean-Pierre Gadiollet was in charge of a stand at the plant fair, l'Arche aux Plantes, in Brittany. The weekend of May 4th, members returned to visit Françoise and Philippe Larrue in the wine country of Médoc, north of Bordeaux. It was the

occasion for a majority of those who attended the Fous trip to Southern California the previous fall to reunite and share pictures and memories. Annual events were repeated again this year at the Southern Garden Festival in Uzès, overseen by Yves Pia, the plant fair in Gaujac in the Landes, where Patrick Marty and Steve Swinscoe met with members and new palm fans and the Plant Days Fair at Courson, in the park of the chateau there, where the stand was tended by Robert Leroy and François Woelffel.

The spring highlight was our general assembly, based in the seaside resort of Saint Cyprien, on the Mediterranean, during the long holiday weekend of May 18-20. The weather was blustery at first but improved throughout the weekend. Garden visits were organized in Saint Cyprien and the nearby city of Perpingnan. We wound up the gettogether in the garden of Geneviève Figuères, with a great picnic in the shade of beautiful Jubaea chilensis. These palms were planted more than 130 years earlier by the French botanist Charles Naudin in what was, at that time, his experimental garden, in He had written that one day Jubaea would be the king of palms in France and those growing in Madame Figuères' garden certainly are regal.

June was a busy month, to begin with on the south coast of Brittany, for the Botanifolies, where Michel Bourbier represented the Fous the first weekend. The following weekend Nicole and Robert Leroy invited members to visit their garden in Chatellerault in the morning and after lunch Michel Flabeau led a guided tour of the botanical garden of the city of Tours, on the Loire River. Gérald Martinez accompanied members across the Italian border to visit the famous Hanbury garden perched above the Mediterranean as well as the former nursery of Ludovico Winter and Pallanca June 22. On June 29 and 30 members in Brittany and the general public attended a plant fair specializing in plants from overseas in St. Quay Portrieux. With the help of Frédéric Tournay, Yann Corbel set up a stand that was particularly popular with the more than 4,000 visitors attending the fair. That same Sunday Serge Dassain organized a visit to the greenhouses of Léon Rogez, our treasurer, perched in the foothills of the

Pyrenees, south of Toulouse. Léon sells palms and other exotic plants, in particular through his website, www.palmaris.org.

One of our vice presidents, Gérard Dorin, once again organized a long weekend trip June 21-24 to the Italian Lake District. A contingent of more than 25 members from all over France joined him for visits to the best gardens along the banks of Lago Maggiore, a truly romantic spot, set against a backdrop of snow-capped Alps.

Better late than never, the June issue of Le Palmier (N°32) was sent to members in early July, with articles concerning the frigid weather the previous December and the effects it had in members gardens across the country, a problem with Butia palms, a description of our General Assembly and dwarfism observed in the genus Washingtonia. This issue was accompanied our long-awaited directory. Our Board decided to publish the directory every other year and the latest edition includes email addresses and cell phone numbers as more and more people in France get connected.

In September, Brent Hubbard of Oceanic Palms showed slides of his trip to Fiji in 1987. Brent also spoke about his experiences of shifting large *Rhopalostylis baueri* palms when others thought this could not be done. These palms are still there today and looking good. His firm was one of the first to uproot and replant sizeable palms

The October 1st meeting featured Carolyn Melling from Landsendt, who is well versed in the art of landscaping with palms and cycads. Carolyn showed slides of her stand at the Ellerslie Flower Show. The use of palms and bromeliads was excellent, as was the water feature. There was later discussion on splits in palm trunks. Gerald Endt noted that these splits have occurred in *Parajubaea cocoides* and he thinks they may be related to fertiliser and water.

About 35 members turned up for the November meeting on a wet Guy Fawkes night, but the speaker did not arrive. The meeting was then devoted to discussion on ways to improve the NZP&CS. John Pettit led a discussion on *Archontophoenix cunninghamiana* (Bangalow palm) and why some develop vertical splits in their trunks. These palms were reported going wild and becoming dominant in the Waitakeret Ranges in Auckland, as is happening in Hawaii with the *A. alexandrae*, which is

becoming "a noxious weed." Concerns varied amongst the members present.

The NZP&CS met on December 3rd for "the Big Auction." Plants available included Wallichia densiflora, Pritchardia beccariana, Dypsis decaryi, Chambeyronia macrocarpa, Archontophoenix "Illawara," Geonoma undata, Jubaea x Butia, Parajubaea sunkha and many other palms and cycads.

On February 4th, Dave Anderson spoke from his long experience with the Society. Dave is one of the long-standing members from the Society's early days and offered interesting insights from the past.

On February 23rd, Colin Ferguson, a long-time member of the Society, led members and guests around the Northshore to see the extensive range of plants and plantings. The morning tour was capped off with a look at the Takapuna market.
