Call for Nominations for IPS Directors 2004 – 2008 Term

[Repeat Call for Nomination of Candidates.]

As announced in the past issue of *Palms*, it will soon be time for the election of those IPS Directors who will serve for the years 2004 to 2008. If there is anyone you know who can contribute to the goals of the International Palm Society and who is willing to dedicate the time necessary to serve as a Director, please submit his/her name for nomination.

The Administrative Secretary, Libby Besse must receive nominations, by **September 30**, **2003**. The election ballots will be mailed with the December 2003 issue of *Palms*. Elections results will be published in the June 2004 *Supplement* to *Palms*.

Nominating requirements: A candidate must have been a Member of the Society for two years before being nominated for the position of Director. Any IPS Member may propose a candidate for nomination by writing an email or letter to the Administrative Secretary. A second proposal in writing from another Member is also required. The proposed candidate must submit to the Secretary a written consent of willingness to serve if nominated and elected. The proposed candidate must also send the Secretary a short palm-related biography, which will be included on the ballot.

When the above conditions have been met, the Secretary will forward the proposed candidate's name to the Nominating Committee for consideration as a nominee and selection for the ballot.

Nominating Committee guidelines: Directors are elected for a four-year term with terms staggered so that approximately half the Directors will be installed at each Biennial meeting. The Nominating Committee will use the regional distribution of members as a guide for insuring worldwide representation.

Duties and expectations of the IPS Directors: The Board of 34 Directors has general charge of the affairs and business of the Society including the management of the Society's funds. Directors are expected to take an active role in Board activities by serving on appropriate committees set up for specific tasks and concerns. The Board meets once a year, at

the Biennial meeting or at an Interim Meeting (usually held in the USA).

While it is not an absolute requirement, an ability and willingness to travel to all (or most) of the annual Board Meetings at the Director's own expense is, by necessity, a strong consideration used by the Nominating Committee when selecting candidates. [Note that 2003, 2004 and 2005 meetings are all planned for United States locations.] Directors are also expected to be accessible by email.

Directors for the 2004 – 2008 term will be installed at the Board of Directors Meeting in May 2004 at the time of the Hawaii Biennial.

On Easter Sunday, the Brisbane and Sunshine Coast Branches of PACSOA and guests were treated to a guided tour of the gardens at Palm Fascinations, a wholesale nursery located on the Petrie Creek road just east of Nambour. Palm Fascinations is owned and operated by Mike and Sharon Kvauka. In addition to palm production, they now also supply a myriad of Cordylines to the retail nursery market. A large group turned out for this rare visit (as the gardens are normally open to the public only once a year as part of the National Open Garden Scheme.) Conditions were perfect and plants were fantastic. garden is packed with mature palms. Among the more magnificent palms were three specimens of Pigafetta filaris, each towering to an awesome height of at least sixty feet. Understory palms in that area included Arenga porphyrocarpa, Chambeyronia macrocarpa, Lytocarvum weddellianum, Marojejya darianii, Areca vestiaria and Oraniopsis appendiculata, a most slow-growing species yet to form a trunk. A massive Caryota maxima with several mature specimens of Dypsis leptocheilos and Wodyetia bifurcata contributed to the area's canopy. The rest of the garden was equally impressive. [For full details of the garden tour, see the May/June 2003 Newsletter of the Brisbane Palm and Cycad Society, from whence this summary was taken.]

The May meeting of the Brisbane society featured Stan Gill of S&G Irrigation, who spoke on appropriate use of irrigation systems in palm and cycad gardens.

The June outing was to the K-Palms nursery and garden of Rolf Kyburz, with over twenty members and guests in attendance. Rolf had extensive seed offerings for members. Ross's beautifully landscaped gardens contained

numerous large and interesting palms and cycads. Rolf has recently diversified into xerophytic plants such as cacti and Pachypodiums, but the dominant plants remain palms and cycads. The propagation houses also contained very interesting plants, including grass trees grown from seed.

On July 15th, Hugh Kunze spoke on "Adventures in Sarawak" from whence he had just returned. A very interesting presentation.

A field trip was taken August 17th to Peter Heibloem's Eudlo Cycad Garden. This coincided with a visit of Maroochy Shire Botanical Gardens' supporters. Peter gave a personalized tour of his garden and provided food and drink, as well as many cycads available for purchase.

The meeting for September 16th is scheduled to feature Olive and Len Trevor, coproprietors of "The Olive Branch" bromeliad nursery. Olive and Len will present "Bromeliads for the Palm and Cycad Garden."

The October 19th field day is planned to be to the Chinderah Nursery of Narelle and Larry Reynolds. It has been several years since the group met there and it is well worth a visit. Narelle and Larry have some wonderful plants of *Marojejya darianii*, *Howea belmoreana*, *Dictyosperma album*, *Salacca zalacca*, etc.

One November 18th, Philippe Cherrier of Association Chambeyronia will speak to the Brisbane society on "Palms of New Caledonia."

Palm & Cycad Society of Western Australia News

The Palm & Cycad Society of Western Australia (PACSOWA) June 24th featured Ken Jones of the WA Species Orchid Society speaking about orchids and their cultivation here in WA. These beautiful and fascinating plants are excellent companion plants for palms The "Short Talk" by Norm and cycads. Patterson was "Caryotas — Why I Love Them and Hate Them." Norm went through the pros and cons of some of the species he is growing including Caryota urens, C. obtusa, C. gigas, C. cumingii, C. ochlandra and C. mitis. discussing various pros and cons in growing palms of this genus, Norm warned about the toxicity of the flesh around some Carvota seeds. This can cause severe burning and irritation of the skin and eyes if not handled properly.

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) on July 22nd focused on society business, but also featured a short talk on *Chamaedorea deckeriana* by *Chamaedorea* expert and collector, Leon Cobban. This Costa Rican cloud-forest palm thrives at 900-m (3,425 feet) altitude in wet cloud forests with over 3 m (almost 10 feet) of annual rainfall. It is not often found in Western Australia collections. If grown in this dry climate, it requires "a lot of water and daily misting." There was also a general discussion about palms and cycads.

Palmeraie-Union, La Réunion Chapter Summary of the First Semester 2003

We ended 2002 with the publication of *Latania* N° 8, containing articles about the IPS Biennial in France in September, *Acanthophoenix rubra* and *Dictyosperma album* palms of "L'Anse des Cascades", the natural population of *Latania lontaroides* near Petite Ile, articles about the travels of our members to the Seychelles, California, Thailand and Paris.

The first meeting of the year took place at Grand Etang (big pond) Plaine des Palmistes on January 26th, discovering the rich endemic

vegetation around this pond including a population of *Hyophorbe indica* with characteristics distinguishing them from populations found in the southwest: curved palms, big yellow fruits, long seeds for the Grand Etang population; much less curved palms, red fruits and round seeds for the southwest populations. These populations are separated by the Piton de la Fournaise.

Near the summit, we observed also many specimens of *Acanthophoenix crinita* and other endemic species of the Réunion highlands. We were guests for lunch at a farm restaurant for a huge "Carivolaille," a local speciality.

On February 23rd, we visited the beautiful garden of Gaby and Suzy Hoarau at L'Entre-Deux with his rich collection of palms (62 species) and orchids.

A round-table was organized in March at Nicole Ludwig's home to review the pests of ornamental palms (Acutaleurodes palmae, Iceria seychellarum, Ceroplastes sp., Gestionella sp., Graphiola phoenicis, Colletotrichum sp., etc.) and treatments.

Hawaii Island Palm Chapter

The Hawaii Island Palm Society featured a field trip to the Hawaii Palm Company (Peter Palm's Botanical Garden) in Kapaau, North Kohala. Host Peter Messmer (a.k.a. Peter Palm) who moved to Hawaii from Switzerland has evolved his palm hobby into a 15+ year commercial nursery offering over five hundred species of plants, including more that 300 different palms and cycads in various sizes. In addition to the nursery plants, there are hundreds of species of palms planted throughout the nursery grounds. Some favorites include the rare variegated Euterpe precatoria (now about fifty feet tall), large Dypsis lastelliana (red neck palm), Pigafetta, clumping Arenga undulatifolia with dramatic glaucous-backed leaflets, various and the gorgeous Clinostigma species Marojejya darianii, reputed to be the largest of this species on Hawaii Island. entire-leaf palm with 20-foot fronds and a 6-foot trunk is now flowering.

A tour of Al and Sylvia Bredeson's South Kona Garden in Captain Cook was conducted August 2nd. Ten years ago this 3+ acre parcel was bulldozed out of a dry-type forest with dominant trees being ohia, lama, kukui and Christmas berry. The property is at 1,250 to 1,300-foot elevations (380 to 395 m)

overlooking Papa Bay. Fifty of the palms were numbered so that members could test their identification skills - checking later against a handout giving the answers. The garden tour was followed by Sylvia's Mexican-style lunch.

All seeds on this list are from cultivated plants. Trinidad & Tobago Palm Book

The Palm Book of Trinidad and Tobago Including the Lesser Antilles, by Paul L. Comeau, Yasmin S. Comeau and Winston Johnson and published by the International Palm Society is now available for ordering. Please see bookstore flyer at the end of this Supplement for ordering information.

As indicated in the title, the book provides a detailed account of the native palms of Trinidad and Tobago (and the Lesser Antilles). These palms form part of the natural heritage of this fascinating and enchanting group of southern Caribbean islands. Not since the famous taxonomist L.H. Bailey published an article in 1947 has there been a comprehensive treatment of these indigenous palms. This book provides an updated account intended to increase the awareness of this important and increasingly threatened group of neotropical palms.

Detailed information on each of Trinidad and Tobago's 22 species of native palms is presented. The species covered include member of Euterpe, Prestoea, Attalea, Bactris, and Desmoncus and 10 other genera. Full-color photographs throughout the book illustrate each of the palms. Each species account includes, the local name(s), the geographical distribution and density, a botanical description, highlighting distinguishing features, comparisons with other similar palms, habitat preference, pollinators, economic distributors. uses conservation status. A distribution map shows each species' geographical range.

Additional sections of the book cover the 12 species of native palms found in the Lesser Antilles, introduced palms, native palms with peculiar distributions, a glossary, nomenclatural notes on botanical and common names, synonyms, photograph data, references cited and recommended further reading.

The Palm Book of Trinidad has been carefully written to be accessible to all interested readers. The botanical descriptions focus on easily observable features -- the large-scale, noticeable and unique features of the palms. The native palms are grouped in general categories based on botanical, habitat and abundance features. The approach used by the authors facilitates the process of getting to know these native palms.
