Tropical Garden Society of Sydney (IPS Chapter)

The Tropical Garden Society of Sydney (Incorporating the Palm and Cycad Society) held their 2004 Christmas Party at the home and garden of Fred and Denuda Moody

The Society meeting of November 23rd, 2004, featured a large number of auction plants and all were sold. Palms included were: *Chamaedorea elatior*, *C. metallica*, *C. radicalis* (multiple), *C. stolonifera*, *C. woodsoniana*, (multiple), *Normanbya normanbyi*, *Lytocaryum*

weddellianum, Reinhardtia gracilis, and Sabal minor. Other plants in the auction included aroids (Aglaonema 'Parrot Jungle', Alocasia cucullata (Chinese Taro), A. wentii, and Anthurium longipeltatum), Marantaceae (Calathea 'Thai Beauty', Ctenanthe lubbersiana), Bromeliads (Aechmea cv., A. gamosepela, Neoregelia 'Grace' and Nidularium innocentii var. wittmarkiana), Gingers (Costus barbatus and Hedychium gracile), a fern (Asplenium obtusatum), Cordyline terminalis, a lily (Eucharis grandiflora), Hibiscus cooperi 'Rose Flake' and the rainforest plant Davidsonia pruriens.

The 2005 Annual General Meeting was held on January 25th for election of Officers and Committee. Speaker at the meeting was Society President, Fred Moody who concluded his slide presentation of recent visits to some of the great gardens of the world, this time including Frankfurt, Lednice, Geneva and Singapore Botanic Gardens.

The March 22nd meeting featured Gleness Larnach of "Bromeliads Australia" who gave a presentation on "Bromeliads, their care and propagation". Gleness also brought along some collector's items for sale.

The March color issue of "*Tropica*" featured two main themes:

- Gingers, for Sydney gardens.
- Chamaedorea for Sydney gardens, Part 3: the smaller solitary species, including: C. adscendens, C. allenii, C. deckeriana, C. elegans, C. ernesti-augusti, C. frondosa, C. geonomiformis, C. metallica, C. oreophila, and C. tenella.

The Open Garden Scheme featured a visit to "Tropical Breeze", the private garden of one of the Society members, Helen Curran, located at 24 Johnson Avenue, Seven Hills, on February 5th and 6th. Helen is the Sydney representative for the International Cordyline Society. Her garden boasts a collection of well-grown Cordylines set amongst bamboo, palms, acalyphas, bromeliads and other tropical foliage beauties. The rear garden features a Balinese style pavilion and swimming pool with a waterfall set in tropical foliage and is a credit to Helen and her husband Neil who have done all of the work themselves. The garden has survived winter low temperatures of -3 degrees Celsius and due to Helen's busy schedule it generally survives on natural rainfall.

Palm & Cycad Society of Western Australia News

At the November PACSOWA meeting, Norm Patterson presented a video and slide presentation of his and Gwen's recent trip to the Pilbara and Kimberley which included visits to a number of palm nurseries and some little known out-of-the-way places along the coast. Barry Shelton gave a short talk on his and Chris' road trip from Perth to Kalbarri and points in between. Barry's article on this trip is published in three parts in the last three editions of PalmsWest.

The Christmas party was a great evening, thanks to the generosity and hard work of hosts Norm and Gwen Patterson.

The main talk for the January 25th PACSOWA meeting was on "Palm & Cycad Look-alikes and Companions", hosted by John Banasiewicz. The meeting showcased plants that

complement palms and cycads or are used as companion plants in tropical gardens, e.g., elephant ears, ferns, Strelitzia, Pandanus, Monstera, Cannas, travelers palms, bananas, Beaucarnea (ponytails), etc. The list is endless. In the February issue of PalmsWest, George Sevastos provided detailed notes on some of the plants featured, including:

- Carludovica palmata (Panama Hat "Palm", not a palm but in Cyclanthaceae family).
- Pandanus utilis (called Madagascan Screw Palm or Screw Pine, in Pandanaceae family).
- Molineria capitulata (Queensland palm grass in family Hypoxidaceae) which resembles juvenile Syagrus palms.
- Beaucarnea recurvata (Ponytail "Palm", in the Agavaceae family
- Dracaena marginata (also in Agavaceae)
- Aspidistra elatior (Cast Iron plant in Liliaceae), resembles Bactris trailiana.

The main talk on February 22nd, was on "Propagating Cycads" and covered all aspects such as pollination, seed germination and the techniques involved in taking 'pups' from the parent plant. This talk will be led by Norm Patterson with help from other experts.

There was a great selection of plants at the February meeting, including a large (2 meter) Coconut Palm and some rare *Licuala* seedlings. Thanks to Reg and Dale Lysle for bringing them.

In light of the problems with Busy Bee attendance levels reported in January, a number of experienced members (led by George Sevastos and Norm) provided background and historical perspective on Gascoyne Park. A brief recap of that is given below, with more in Norm described the dedication, PalmsWest. enthusiasm and plain hard work of the founding members in the early days in getting the Park going. The original members used to meet each other when selling palms through ads in the papers and eventually decided to form a club to pursue their common interests. An early attempt to establish a botanic garden at Hartfield Park in Forrestfield failed though theft and vandalism, damage to plants and lack of watering. It was eventually abandoned.

In the early days at Gascoyne Park, there were many long working bees and planting marathons where members even camped overnight to protect the plants! Some of the pioneers of those times were Ken Adcock, John Banasiewicz, Eric Mole, the Pattersons,

Skinners, Lanes, Lees, Ercegs, Tomlinsons and Lewkowskis. There was a great team spirit among the group.

George Sevastos described the formal background of the establishment and history of the Park. In the late 1980's, the Society was looking to acquire land to establish a palm and cycad botanic garden. The then Shire of Wanneroo, now the City of Joondalup, came to the rescue and Gascovne Park was established in 1989. The Park is located in the northern Perth suburb of Woodvale. The Park covers an area of 5.2 ha (12.9 acres) and has thousands of palms, cycads, eucalyptus trees and other native vegetation. The Park resembles a small tropical island in the middle of the Pacific. acquisition, the Park has gone through different stages of transformation to where it is today. Through hard work and sheer determination, the Park is looking better than ever.

Three area zones have been established to accommodate the different plant species as not all plants can thrive and survive in the same type of environment:

- Open Savannah plants more suitable for drier areas
- Open Forest semi-shaded and more sun tolerant species
- Rainforest dense planting creating a microclimate for shade loving plants

There are approximately 2,000 palms and cycads planted in the Park with some well established species. Some 500 or more have been lost to theft and/or vandalism over the years. There are over a 100 species of palms representing 38 genera and about 35 species of cycad representing 7 genera. The first official listing of species was conducted in November 1996 by Barry Shelton and George Sevastos and took two full days to complete.

The official opening was held in March 1996 and was attended by the Hon Cheryl Edwardes MLA, Member for Kingsley and the Mayor of Wanneroo. More than 100 people attended including local residents and Society members. It was a resounding success.

Busy bees are held once a month, usually on the fourth Sunday of the month. The dates are published in PalmsWest. Duties include pruning, weeding, spraying, planting, fertilizing and mulching. The aim is to keep the Park clean and tidy at all times.

Gascoyne Park is well known in gardening circles throughout Australia and is the biggest

and most diverse collection of palms and cycads in Western Australia. 2005 will be its 20th anniversary. The hope and plan is that the work of the Park founders will not be wasted and that the Park continue to be developed and maintained so that future generations can enjoy and learn from this magnificent resource.

The last Busy Bee for 2004 on December 12th only had three attendees — Tony Bowyer, Ian Judge and George Sevastos. Due to the small attendance, all efforts were directed towards pruning, tidying up fallen fronds and planting. In addition to pruning, six Cuban *Roystonea* were planted, four next to the gazebo and Royal Avenue and the other two in the *Chamaedorea* enclosure.

PACSOWA met on March 2nd at the Rotary Hall, The main talk was by local bromeliad expert, Don Woods, who educated members and guests on the propagation, care and culture of bromeliads. Don Clemkey gave a short talk about two cycad species which are native to the northwest of Western Australia, *Cycas furfuracea* and *C. armstrongii*.

The Cannington Palm, Cycad and Fern Show and Sale held last November 27-28 at the Cannington Showgrounds was a huge success. Many members and guests attended, putting forth a great effort for the event. Sales revenues were well up over last year.

Subscription fees for the 2004-2005 financial year are A\$20 for single membership and A\$25 for families. There is a once-off joining fee of A\$5 for new members. On payment of fees, members will receive a membership card from the Treasurer.

The Society 2005 program got underway on February 1st, featuring a guest speaker from England, Stuart Dixon. Stuart is a lecturer in horticulture and well-known broadcaster from *Down to Earth Garden Talks*. This was a most entertaining evening. There were also the usual activities: trading table, raffle etc.

A Palm & Subtropicals Trip to the "Far North" trip by minibus was arranged for the weekend of February 19-20th — "two days of wandering around some great palm, cycad and other plant locations from Whangerei, carrying on north to just beyond Awanui." On Saturday, the meeting took in the Austin Brothers just south of Kaitaia and moved on to Peter and Pauline Enticott's Lake Ngatu Plantations near Waipapakauri and then north to Awanui, with the evening spent at Mill Bay Hotel in Mangonui. Places visited on Sunday included Lindo Fergusson's Mangonui property, PalmCo at Kerikeri and Russell Fransham's nursery at Matapouri Bay. Thanks to Philip Millar for coordinating this event.

The March 1st meeting was attended by about 45 members. General business started the evening, including which seeds have been sent out recently by the Seed Bank, the upcoming annual sale requirements. The show's stall is being used by the NZ society to raise money to fund our effort to add to our MAF list, handled by Michael Budd. An upcoming nursery visit was mentioned and Philip Millar is handling that, so contact him for more information.

The speaker of the night was John Lok and the subject was the Cycad Conference 2005 which he attended. We saw photos of a couple of gardens and nurseries in the USA. Some of the Encephalartos were impressive; especially an E. princeps. Species like E. whitelockii and E. kisambo were shown and it was obvious that size must be considered when selecting planting locations for these. One of Gary Coleman's favorite Encephalartos (E. cerinus) then we moved onto Mexico and mainly Dioons. John indicated that most Dioon species look very similar. Photos of D. califanoi and D. purpusii probably did not do these species justice. Ceratozamia species also got a mention.

The NZ Palm & Cycad magazine has recently included articles on various New Zealand growing experiences with various species of *Dypsis*. The more uncommon ones were covered in Issue 94 (NZ Summer 2004-

2005) with a focus in the March 2005 issue on experiences with *Dypsis decaryi*, *D. decipiens*, *D. lutescens*, and *D. baronii*.

The Society Seed Bank (Gary Coleman) sent out the following seeds at the end of December 2004: Alloschmidia glabrata, Chamaedorea cataractarum, C. glaucifolia and Basselinia gracilis. Had hoped to also have Dioon califanoi but not enough arrived.

News from the Central Florida Palm & Cycad Society

The last issue of the *Supplement* incorrectly stated that the CFPACS September meeting was cancelled because of the hurricanes that seriously impacted local members.

The September meeting of the CFPACS was held in the Orlando area on September 18th, 2004, in the interval between Hurricane Francis' departure and the advent of Hurricane Jeanne. The meeting venue was indoors at the air-Resort Palms conditioned Gaylord Kissimmee. This is an 8-story hotel angled into an atrium higher than the hotel building itself. The atrium contains 4.5 acres at ground level, with an artful series of terraces and levels, broad staircases. numerous accessed by Arranged between the ponds, restaurants and bars were 28 species of palms, orchids, bromeliads, *Bougainvillea*, *Hibiscus*, *Caladium*, gingers, etc. A good-sized *Cyrtostachys renda* was located in a rather obscure corner. The atrium's many coconuts (*Cocos nucifera*) and *Roystonea* are certainly not evident on the outside streets of the Orlando area.

Willie Tang showed slides and explained the cycad conservation (Cycas debaoensis) project in China that he has helped create and which CFPACS has continued to assist in underwriting. Palms seen by Willie in association with these cycads include the cliff-dwelling Guihaia argyrata and G. grossifibrosa and a large Caryota species that has become evident in areas where the original forest had been cleared. An species was also Rhapis unrecognized encountered on the trail. Some introduced palms were also in evidence, with the most common Archontophoenix Australian being the alexandrae.

After the morning presentation and lunch, members and guests moved no to Dave Witt's for the plant auction and sale.

The Winter meeting of the CFPACS was held in Sarasota on December 11th, 2004, hosted by Rob Branch. Rob has about 175 palm varieties planted on his one-acre garden, with another 50 planned for the Spring of 2005. Landscaped pathways lead from one enchanting area to another.
