### Call for Nominations for IPS Directors 2006 – 2010 Term

It will soon be time for the election of those IPS Directors who will serve for the years 2006 to 2010. If there is anyone you know who can contribute to the goals of the International Palm Society and who is willing to dedicate the time necessary to serve as a Director, please submit his/her name for nomination.

Nominations must be received by the Administrative Secretary, Libby Besse, by **September 30, 2005**. The election ballots will be mailed with the December 2005 issue of *Palms*. Elections results will be published in the June 2006 *Supplement* to *Palms*.

Nominating requirements: A candidate must have been a Member of the Society for two years before being nominated for the position of Director. Any IPS Member may propose a candidate for nomination by writing an email or letter to the Administrative Secretary. A second proposal in writing from another Member is also required. The proposed candidate must submit to the Secretary a written consent of willingness to serve if nominated and elected. The proposed candidate must also send the Secretary a short palm-related biography, which will be included on the ballot.

When the above conditions have been met, the Secretary will forward the proposed candidate's name to the Nominating Committee for consideration as a nominee and selection for the ballot.

Nominating Committee guidelines: Directors are elected for a four-year term with terms staggered so that approximately half the Directors will be installed at each Biennial meeting. The Nominating Committee will use the regional distribution of members as a guide for insuring worldwide representation.

Duties and expectations of the IPS Directors: The Board of 34 Directors has general charge of the affairs and business of the Society including the management of the Society's funds. Directors are expected to take an active role in Board activities by serving on appropriate committees set up for specific tasks and concerns. The Board meets once a year, at the Biennial meeting or at an Interim Meeting (usually held in the USA).

While it is not an absolute requirement, an ability and willingness to travel to all (or most) of the annual Board Meetings at the Director's own expense is, by necessity, a strong consideration used by the Nominating Committee when selecting candidates. Directors are also expected to be accessible by email.

Directors for the 2006 – 2010 term will be installed at the Board of Directors Meeting in October 2006 at the time of the Dominican Republic Biennial.

The Nominating Committee for the upcoming election is comprised of Faith Bishock, Chair, and Libby Besse, Horace Hobbs, Jeanne Price, Randy Moore, and Sue Rowlands.

#### **IPS 2005 Endowment Fund Grants**

The Board of Directors of the International Palm Society met in late April at the Montgomery Botanical Center. The IPS Endowment Fund Committee (consisting of all board members) met and agreed to support the following palm-related research projects:

- Dr. Andrew Henderson, New York Botanical Garden – Field work in China for the book Field Guide to the Palms of Southern Asia. Award: \$5850.00. Dr. Henderson is the recipient of this year's Phyllis and Mel Sneed Travel Award.
- Dr. Ramiro Bustamante, Dr. Rodrigo Vásquez, Dr. Elie Poulin and Luis González (all with the Universidad de Chile) Study on population structure of the Chilean palm *Jubaea chilensis* and the biological basis for its conservation. This project addresses one of the main aims of the IPS, namely, conservation; and the subject of the proposal, *Jubaea*, is an important ornamental palm, familiar to most IPS members. The Board funded the proposal in full, awarding \$5000.00.
- Joanna Tucker, Ph.D. student in Interdisciplinary Ecology, University of Florida – Study of the ecology of oilproducing palms in Brazil and associated implications for biodiesel production. This student project has the potential to produce important baseline data on the ecology of ethnobotanically significant palms in Brazil. Funded in full for \$1502.00.
- Angelica Cibrian Jaramillo, Department of Ecology, Evolution and Environmental Biology, Columbia University, New York – Study of spatial ecology of *Chamaedorea* ernesti-augusti. The well prepared proposal stated several clear goals and hypotheses to be tested. The board awarded the full requested funding of \$1000. [The applicant was also advised that she should coordinate her research activities with the research teams in Copenhagen, the Natural History Museum, London, and NYBG – other teams working on aspects of phylogeny and ecology of *Chamaedorea*.]
- Arlington James, Forestry, Wildlife & Parks Division, Ministry of Agriculture & Environment, Botanic Gardens, Dominica

   Dominica Palms Survey supplement. The applicant requested funds to cover shortfalls incurred while surveying palms

- in Dominica, a project previously funded by the IPS in 2003. The request was modest and the applicant has a track record of successful field work and has contributed to *PALMS*. Granted full funding \$960.00.
- Mrs. Bee Gunn, Senior Herbarium Assistant, Missouri Botanical Garden -Extension of Taxonomic Study of Antillean Prestoea. The applicant requested and was granted an extension of the project for one year (through 2006). The IPS funded the project last year.

### 2006 IPS Biennial Meeting Dominican Republic

The 2006 Biennial Meeting of the International Palm Society will be held in the Dominican Republic on October 1-8, 2006. The Biennial will kick off in Santo Domingo with visits to a number of gardens including the National Botanical Garden. The venue will then move into other areas of the country, visiting a number of palms in habitat. Leonel Mera in the Dominican Republic is assisting the IPS with local arrangements.

There will be no IPS-sponsored Post Biennial Tour associated with the 2006 Biennial.

### **Tropical Garden Society of Sydney**

The Tropical Garden Society of Sydney (Incorporating the Palm and Cycad Society) met on May 24<sup>th</sup>, with Jessica Biddlecombe demonstrating how to grow carnivorous plants. Jessica is a member of the Carnivorous Plants Society. She has been collecting and growing these strange life forms since 1979, being first inspired by a movie in which plants ate people. In the early 1980s she and her husband began selling plants. Jessica brought some of these plants for sale. The \$1 raffle and auction followed the talk.

Palms at the last meeting's auction included Chamaedorea costaricana (multiple), C. oblongata (multiple), C. stolonifera, C. tepejilote and Dypsis decipiens. Many other plants were also auctioned including Heliconias, Cordylines, gingers, aroids, bromeliads, and other plants.

The 20-page *Tropica* magazine, with articles and color photographs, is published three times a year, alternating with a *Newsletter*, which has details of the next meeting. The July magazine *Tropica* will have two main themes:

- 'Elephant Ears', i.e., *Alocasia*, *Colocasia* and *Xanthosoma*. Especially those suitable for our gardens, plus a few indoor favorites.
- Small Palms for Sydney gardens (other than Chamaedorea). What is small? In the Sydney climate, looking at a 20-year span: Allagoptera arenaria, Basselinia gracilis, Calamus carvotoides, Chuniophoenix nana, Guihaia argyrata, Hedyscepe canterburyana, Lepidorrhachis mooreana, Licuala sumawongii ("elegans"), peltata var. Linospadix minor. *L*.. monostachva Lvtocarvum weddellianum, Pinanga coronata, Sabal minor, Schippia concolor, Syagrus schizophylla. This leaves many others like Coccothrinax for another time as 'small to moderate' in size.

At the April 26<sup>th</sup> meeting, Norm Patterson led a general talk on *Rhapis* palms; joined at different stages by members Don Clemkey, Tony Bowyer, Cliff Britto and Roger Lorriman. Each talked about particular specimens they had brought in. Members received advice on the different species available, how to source plants, keep them vigorous and healthy, and how to encourage variegation (a highly prized attribute for serious collectors.) There were some very rare and expensive plants on display; many thanks to those members who took the time to contribute to the talk and share their special plants with the Society.

For the short talk, Don Clemkey demonstrated his ingenious, home-made water well pots made from recycled soft drink bottles. These cost nothing and have been proven to be effective in growing *Rhapis* seedlings.

The May 24<sup>th</sup> auction was a great success. ### New Zealand Palm & Cycad Society

The April 5<sup>th</sup> meeting of the New Zealand Palm & Cycad Society was attended by fewer people than the last several meetings. The upcoming weekend's Annual discussed. The expected guess speaker, Barry Meiring, had to cancel so John Pettit stepped in to speak about his property on Kawau Island which he has had for at least the last 12 years. As evidenced by the photographs, he has done much work on his 7-acre property; with extensive planting of palms, cycads and other plants. One of his main problems is that the wallabies eat much of what is planted; and all small plants need mesh cages for protection. Water can be another problem in drier years. John has planted a wide range of palms and most looked great. Queen palms (Syagrus romanzoffiana) with a rotten base look were discussed. John's solution is to put more dirt or compost around the base.

The May 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting started with normal business such as sales, library and seedbank reports. The night's program consisted of a panel of members answering questions on palm and cycad care, in particular topics like winter fertilizing, repotting, and sheltering. Much interesting information was given out on different elements of fertilizers and their uses, as well as useful tips on cold/warm air and soil temp. One interesting topic was the difference in winter growth on plants like *Jubaea* between Auckland (latitude 36.9° S) and Kerikeri

(latitude 35.2° S). Other topics covered included how palms put on growth at night, weed control, and some aspects of cycad growth. The raffle prize was a nice *Caryota gigas*. There were also many nice plants for sale.

One interesting idea that arose after the May meeting was the idea of either providing an online webcam feed or a DVD of each meeting. As one member put it during group email discussion, "Either way is a great solution for out of town members." The school where the Society meets has a WiFi connection, so this will be tried for future meetings.

Congratulations go to Landsendt for winning the "Waitakere City Sustainable Business Award." The Bronze Nikau award is proudly displayed in their Coconut Cafe. With the council's pushing native plantings, it is good to see an exotic nursery in Eco Waitakere getting recognition.

On May 22nd, HIPS toured Pauleen Sullivan's Kapoho Palm Garden. Pauleen's property is comprised of 11 acres, 3\4 mile from the ocean in Kapoho. A resident of Ventura. California. Pauleen bought the parcel, sight unseen, in 1990 after visiting Hawaii as a participant of the 1990 IPS Biennial. Planting started in 1993 and since then, they have brought in truck loads of black cinder to cover the existing solid lava flows to create planting mounds for the palms to grow in. With the help of her son. Terry, they now have about 7 acres mounded and hundreds of palm species planted. The dark cinder mounds provide a starkly beautiful background to "showcase" individual palm species, which are well spaced for prime viewing. Pauleen has a very beautiful silver-gray Bismarckia nobilis, and Arenga brevipes, Hydriastele beccariana and many other rare palm species. In addition, immense numbers of Clinostigma samoense have been planted to provide a canopy for the smaller palms. The border of the property is lined with hundreds of Cyrtostachys renda – an unbelievable sight!

On Sunday, May 29<sup>th</sup>, HIPS held their Annual Zoo Exposition and Plant Sale. This event is sponsored as a fund raiser by the Friends of the Zoo. HIPS supports a table opposite the zoo gift shop to dispense palm wisdom and information, encourage people to join HIPS and to give away palm plants and seeds.
