There will be no IPS-sponsored Post Biennial Tour associated with the 2006 Biennial.

Call for Nominations for IPS Directors 2006 – 2010 Term [Repeat Call for Candidate Nominations]

As announced in the previous issue of *Palms*, it will soon be time for the election of those IPS Directors who will serve for the years 2006 to 2010. If there is anyone you know who can contribute to the goals of the International Palm Society and who is willing to dedicate the time necessary to serve as a Director, please submit his/her name for nomination.

The Administrative Secretary, Libby Besse must receive nominations, by **December 1**, **2005.** Election ballots will be mailed with the March 2006 issue of *Palms*. Elections results will be published in the June 2006 *Supplement* to *Palms*.

Nominating requirements: A candidate must have been a Member of the Society for two years before being nominated for the position of Director. Any IPS Member may propose a candidate for nomination by writing an e-mail or letter to the Administrative Secretary. A second proposal in writing from another Member is also required. The proposed candidate must submit to the Secretary a written consent of willingness to serve if nominated and elected. The proposed candidate must also send the Secretary a short palm-related biography, which will be included on the ballot.

When the above conditions have been met, the Secretary will forward the proposed

candidate's name to the Nominating Committee for consideration as a nominee on the ballot.

Nominating Committee guidelines: Directors are elected for a four-year term with terms staggered so that approximately half the Directors will be installed at each Biennial meeting. The Nominating Committee will use the regional distribution of members as a guide for insuring worldwide representation.

Duties and expectations of the IPS Directors: The Board of 34 Directors has general charge of the affairs and business of the Society including the management of the Society's funds. Directors are expected to take an active role in Board activities by serving on appropriate committees set up for specific tasks and concerns. The Board meets once a year, at the Biennial meeting or at an Interim Meeting (usually held in the USA).

While it is not an absolute requirement, an ability and willingness to travel to all (or most) of the annual Board Meetings at the Director's own expense is, by necessity, a strong consideration used by the Nominating Committee when selecting candidates. Directors are also expected to be accessible by e-mail.

Directors for the 2006 – 2010 term will be installed at the Board of Directors Meeting in October 2006 at the time of the Dominican Republic Biennial.

Palm & Cycad Society of Western Australia News

The June 28th PACSOWA general meeting featured well-known naturalist and author Eric McCrum with an entertaining and fascinating presentation about the famous Gibb River Road. rugged unsealed track which stretches approximately 700km through the central Kimberley Plateau from King Sound at Derby to the Cambridge Gulf at Wyndham. The majority of the road surface is of dirt and gravel construction, with only some floodways paved. Geological features along the track include the spectacular Napier Range, Windjana Gorge, Tunnel Creek, Geike Gorge and the world famous Bungle Bungles. Eric spoke about the animals and features along spectacular stretch of the Kimberley. Eric is one of the most sought after speakers in Western Australia and was very entertaining.

Mark Wooldridge gave a short talk on the unusual cycad *Cycas couttsiana*. Commonly known as the "Glenn Idle Blue", it was first discovered by Pat and David Coutts growing on their station in northern Queensland. In its native habitat, the fronds are a lovely pale blue color. This plant would be a great addition to WA palm and cycad gardens.

More than 50 members of the Society turned out on July 10th to celebrate PACSOWA's 20th birthday at a luncheon and afternoon tea at the home and garden of John and Ann Ellement in Wattleup. It was a great afternoon spent in brilliant winter sunshine. "The day started with

a sausage sizzle lunch, followed by a raffle where nearly everyone won something, the odd glass of red and white wine, lots of shared stories and of course much oohing and aahing over the garden and its contents." Most of the plants which are found in the garden have been collected during their years running Palms Galore nursery in Wattleup and there are many advanced specimens of a size not seen anywhere else in Perth. Some of the more spectacular strikingly variegated a examples were Trachycarpus fortunei, a magnificent Red Latan (Latania lontariodes), a very large clumping Dypsis decipiens, and a huge Caryota gigas. Norm Patterson and Ken Adcock gave short speeches to mark the occasion and remind members of the contributions made by some of the club's original members and those who have worked long and hard to make the organization Coffee and tea with a lush what it is today. spread of cakes, slices and assorted delicious foods were laid out to finish the day.

At the July 26th AGM, outgoing President Mark Wooldridge will give a short talk on two Australian *Livistona* species, *L. alfredii* and *L. victoriae*. Specimens of these hard-to-get plants were available for sale on the Bring 'n' Buy Bench. In view of the AGM and the election of office bearers, there was no main talk in July, but there was a great supper for members to enjoy.

A nice winter day saw eight members turning up for the June "Busy Bee" in Gascoyne Park: Bob Duffey, Ken and Joy Lee, Linda Therkelsen, Gary Meaney, Ian Judge, Don Clemkey, Tony Bowyer and George Sevastos. Much was achieved on the day. The main task performed was pruning the Chamaerops humilis, Phoenix reclinata, P. canariensis, Bismarckia nobilis, Sabal palmetto, Copernicia prunifera, Butia, Archontophoenix, Syagrus, Pritchardia and Livistona species. Ken concentrated on the centre of the Park and weeded around the Cuban Roystonea palms. Another task completed was the relocation and the erection of the new Gascoyne Park sign along Gascoyne Avenue. The new sign is looking great.

Forty palms were planted on the day. Twenty five Sabal minor, one Hyophorbe verschaffeltii (Spindle Palm), twelve Livistona species (3 L. alfredii, 3 L. victoriae 3 L. kimberleyana, 3 L. nasmophila) kindly donated by the Friends of Kings Park. Also planted were two large Phoenix roebelenii

New Zealand Palm & Cycad Society

The Annual General Meeting (AGM) of the New Zealand Palm & Cycad Society in June was attended by some forty members and guests. Caroline from Landsendt gave an interesting talk with photos which covered the early pre-palm days of Landsendt when subtropical fruits formed their income. It was interesting to see how Dick had pioneered growing many of the plants growing in New Zealand. The hard work that went into the crops, grafting issues and the effects of the share market crash were Conservation efforts were also interesting. covered. It was said that their Parajubaea cocoides plantation is probably the biggest in the world in cultivation. The Landsendt efforts with helping out the cycad pollen bank was also discussed and appreciated.

Photographs from the recent society members' trip to the far north were also shown at this meeting. Included were interesting items such as the much talked about variegated *Chamaerops*. The weekend trip, organized by Phillip Millar, was taken by twelve members.

The July 5th meeting featured a talk on the use of wet benches for growing plants, with John Pettit giving a demonstration on how to make one and where to source required resources. There was also discussion over the ARC pest department targeting the Bangalow (Archonto phoenix cunninghamiana) as a potential "pest" and threat to the environment. This matter was discussed by the executive and a subcommittee established to try and stop this from happening. The meeting attendance was low due to bad weather and conflicting sport events. The upcoming Ellersie flower show was discussed as was the ERMA application the NZ Society is doing to start updating the Society's MAF Index. It seems the cycad update will be far more likely to succeed than that for palms.

The speaker at the August meeting was Graham from Daltons in Matamata. His talk was on the latest growing media technology. Daltons started mining pumice and this is still a huge part of their business, but now they are major producers of potting mixes sold under a number

of labels. Their plant at Matamata is huge and employs a lot of technology. They also market a number of other garden products such as fertilizers and weed suppressants. The talk covered how their operation works, their products, and many important factors of growing plants. Items discussed included aged bark, additives, PH levels, water retention and air circulation of mixes as well as independent product testing and comparisons to other mixes.

At the September 2nd meeting, Kevin Johnston led the discussion on "All you ever wanted to know about palms but were frightened to ask."

On October 4th, Donald McPherson will talk on "New trends in nursery culture." Donald will be back from a recent fact finding tour with some new information.

On September 17 - 18, a field trip is planned to the Tauranga area.

Another field trip is scheduled for October 16th to Totara Waters in Totara Road, Whenua pai, to see the gardens of Peter and Jocelyn Coyle.

On November 13th, the Society will conduct a field trip to Drury (south of Auckland) to visit the garden of Robert and Margaret Flanagan.

Pacho has spent many years living in the Amazon rainforests. He is a Catholic priest and botanist whose work has kept him in contact with the people and the palms of the Amazon. He completed his PhD in ethnobotany in Paris in 2004 and met our Hawaii members who attended the 2002 IPS Biennial in

France. He has since made three visits to the Big Island, including the 2004 Biennial. He is currently in his native city of Lima, Peru, teaching at two universities and overseeing botanical projects there as well as in the developing tourist areas at Machu Pichu and Tambopata in Peru. He remains in contact with his three botanical research stations in the northern Amazon basin of Peru where his main interests are in the rich variety of native palms and orchids of the region.

Palm Lectures at Montgomery

In July the Montgomery Botanical Center (MBC) featured several palm lectures in the Nixon-Smiley Meeting room by two well-known palm specialists:

- Dr. William J. Hahn Associate Dean, Georgetown College Associate Research Professor of Biology Georgetown University
- Dr John Leslie Dowe Australian Centre for Tropical Freshwater Research James Cook University Townsville Australia

On July 6th, Dr. Hahn gave a lecture on "Comparative Molecular Phylogenetics Palms." Several comprehensive coding and noncoding DNA sequences datasets have been produced for palms over the past ten years including nuclear and chloroplast DNA data. In this study. Dr. Hahn presents comparative sequence analyses of published data along with new data from several cpDNA loci and nuclear dehydrogenase. Despite alcohol imbalances in taxon sampling, comparative demonstrate cpDNA data analysis congruence in results with four main lineages identified:

- 1) Calamoideae as the first branching element,
- 2) Nypoideae,
- 3) a weakly supported *Coryphoideae* (with *Caryoteae*), and
- 4) Arecoideae (including Ceroxyloideae and Phytelephantoideae).

On July 7th, Dr. Hahn lectured on "Perspectives on the Conservation of Palms" Palm conservation is an important topic in our world, and this talk covered many of the current perspectives on palm conservation.

On July 12th, Dr. John Dowe spoke on "Systematics and taxonomy of *Livistona* (*Arecaceae*)". *Livistona* R.Br. is among the most widespread and diverse of palm genera. Thirty-six species are recognized, distributed in NE Africa, S Arabia, SE and E Asia, Malesia, Melanesia and Australia and occurring in habitats as varied as swamp-forest, heath, rainforest, coastal forests, open woodlands and arid areas. Three morphological species groups are apparent and these are more or less confined to discrete geographical regions:

- 1. Southeast and east Asia;
- 2. Malesia and Melanesia; and
- 3. Australia.

Are they adapted to cyclones? Cyclones, otherwise known typhoons in the northern Pacific Ocean and hurricanes in the Atlantic Ocean, are a regular climatic event in tropical Australia during the summer monsoon season. The short-term effect of destructive winds and torrential rainfall on coastal and near-coastal vegetation can be severe, whilst in the long-term cyclones may influence vegetation dynamics, forest structure and evolutionary patterns. Livistona species in coastal habitats of eastern Australia have leaf morphologies that appear adapted to strong winds, and may represent an example of cyclone adaptation.

- Prestoea acuminata var. montana, harvested by Mike Dahme in Puerto Rico

- Chamaedorea seifrizii, the above three were harvested by Dean VanderBleek in central Florida
- Voanioala (15 huge brown gnarly looking seeds; an interesting conversation piece for the coffee table). These were donated by Joseph Ortanique of California

- Chamaerops humilis var. "cerifera"
- Beccariophoenix madagascariensis
- Ceroxylon alpinum. Native to central Andes at elevations of 4500 to 6500 feet.
- Carvota mitis
- Dypsis sp. "mahajanga"
- Chamaedorea microspadix
- Phoenix canariensis
- Pseudophoenix ekmanii, donated by Vincenzo Rubino in Italy. A rare species endemic to the Dominican Republic.
- Attalea speciosa, donated by Andrew Henderson.
- Syagrus botryophora has strongly recurved leaves, is called the "most beautiful" in the genus by some, and reportedly is one of the world's fastest growing palm! PACSOA's website claims it grows at twice the rate of S. romanzoffiana. Donated by Mike Dahme.
- Astrocaryum gynacanthum, just in from Brazil. Seeds are the shape of almonds, about 22mm long, and black! Several images of this palm can be viewed at http://fm2.fieldmuseum.org/plantguides/res ults.asp? genus=Astrocaryum (you will need to scroll down to the species name). Donated by Bob Riffle.
- Geonoma baculifera or "ringed Geonoma", a smaller palm to about 10 feet tall, unarmed, from moist rainforest habitat. Leaves grow to about 3 feet long, fruits black at maturity. Donated by Bob Riffle.
- Livistona rotundifolia, Beautiful palm with glossy deep green leaves, almost perfectly round when juvenile. Solitary trunk with red ring scars. Grows to about 35 feet. This is a warm growing Livistona, best suited to Zones 10-11. Donated by Mr. Shri Dhar.
- Bactris major var. infesta. A clustering palm whose showy purple fruits are reportedly used to make wine. Seeds donated by Gileno Machado of Brazil.
