Registrants must be IPS members before registering.

Biennial Overview

The 2006 IPS Biennial is being sponsored by the International Palm Society with Leonel Mera as our local host in Dominican Republic. The Dominican Republic shares the island of Hispaniola with Haiti and takes up the eastern two-thirds of the island. Its population is about 9 million people and Santo Domingo is the capital. Tourism is one of the biggest industries so the country is well set up to accommodate visitors.

The Biennial will begin and end in Santo Domingo. We will travel to the southwestern area of the country and stay in the city of Barahona during the middle of the trip. We will visit the National Botanical Garden as well as go to many habitats of native and endemic palms. We complete the tour by returning to Santo Domingo, where we will get a chance to experience the culture of the country. A farewell dinner will bring the tour to its close.

Presentations will be given by leading palm experts from the Caribbean, Latin America and Europe. Some of the speakers will be appearing at an IPS Biennial for the first time.

Biennial 2006

General Information: Please note that a maximum of 200 attendees can participate in the Biennial 2006. Registration will close when we reach this number. All prices quoted throughout are in US Dollars.

Key Dates:

September 30 – Early arrivals and Members of the IPS Board of Directors arrive.

October 1 – Board of Directors Meeting., Attendees arrive for the Welcome Dinner.

October 7 – The Farewell Dinner.

October 8 - Transition day following Biennial

It is advisable for regular attendees attending from great distances to arrive by Saturday, September 30, to comfortably adjust from jet lag. However, it is imperative that Directors and Officers arrive by Saturday, September 30, to attend the Board Meeting to be held on Sunday morning, October 1st.

Early Arrivals and Late Departures: Attendees may choose to arrive earlier or depart later than the above Biennial dates. IPS room rates for designated hotels will apply immediately before and after the Biennial and are available only through our special representatives, Felix Nicolás and Thelma Martinez of Marketing Plus in the Dominican Republic. For details see Contacts for Information. Charges for these extended stays are not included in the registration fee and must be paid separately by the attendee. The fee only covers registration accommodations described in the itinerary.

The IPS cannot book extra days of lodging or airline flights.

Biennial Location: The Biennial will begin and end in the capital city of Santo Domingo. Attendees are advised to make airline reservations early. The IPS cannot guarantee that the itinerary will be followed precisely.

Biennial Registration Form with Payment Information is included as a "tear-out" in the middle of this *supplement* of *Palms*.

Cost of Biennial (October 1 through 8): US\$1,450 per person double occupancy, and US\$1,900 single occupancy. This includes: seven nights hotel accommodations, all meals except for 2 dinners while in Santo Domingo, tours, a helicopter ride to the habitat of *Pseudophoenix ekmanii*, guides, incoming airport transfer from Las Americas Airport and some baggage

handling. Not included are personal expenses such as laundry, telephone, gratuities, bar charges, other meals, trip insurance, flights and airport charges for all flights to and from the Dominican Republic.

Hotel costs and meals for early arrivals (September 30 or earlier) or those staying the night of October 8 or later are **not** included in the Biennial registration fee.

<u>Hotels:</u> We have selected the highest quality hotels available that offer the best value for the money, while providing accommodations and meeting facilities in a common location. Attendees will stay at the following hotels:

- October 1, 2, 6, & 7: Hotel Occidental El Embajador in Santo Domingo
- October 3, 4, & 5: Hotel Costa Larimar in Barahona

Our contacts for all hotels are Felix Nicolás and Thelma Martinez: see Contacts for Information. Room upgrades should be available to early registrants, but such upgrades are at the expense of attendees and must be made through Felix or Thelma. Less expensive rooms are not available. Arrangements have been made for all attendees to stay at the same hotel in each city on the tour.

Partial Registration: Because of the complexity of the Biennial's itinerary and the fact that the group is traveling through multiple areas, partial attendance is unavailable and no reduced rate for partial registration is being offered. Attendees with "special schedules" (i.e. partially attending the Biennial) must pay the full registration fee and arrange their individual transportation to accommodate their specific needs. All others will be charged the regular fee regardless of where they plan their accommodations.

Airfare To and From Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic:

Responsible for booking and paying for their own round trip flights to Santo Domingo. It is suggested you book your tickets early to get the best fares. It is also suggested you book your flights before you register for the biennial. Please note that there are other airports in the island, transportation is only included from "Las Americas Airport"

Book now! Be prepared for very strict, time consuming security inspections at all airports for all flights. Be sure to have a valid passport and avoid carry-on baggage to facilitate inspection.

Biennial Itinerary:

Breakfast buffet is included in the cost of each night's Biennial accommodations.

Sunday, October 1: We shall meet at the Hotel Occidental El Embajador in Santo Domingo. The first activity will be a welcome cocktail followed by dinner, which will formally initiate the 2006 Biennial.

Monday, October 2: We shall have our first contact with native and exotic palms grown in the splendid Botanical Garden of Dr. Rafael Ma. Moscoso in Santo Domingo (www.jbn-sdq.org/). In the Santo Domingo central square we shall see impressive specimens of Sabal domingensis, Roystonea borinquena, Coccothrinax argentea, Bactris plumeriana, Calyptronoma rivalis and Pseudophoenix vinifera, as well the magnificent Haitian Attalea crassispatha. noon we shall leave the city toward the east to visit a golf course where hundreds of adult Acrocomia aculeata were transplanted. See www.guavaberry.org/index.html. We shall eat lunch in that spectacular landscape while enjoying the native flora of the Caribbean coast set off by landscape architect Rosángela Bobea.

Tuesday, October 3: We shall set off for the southeast region of the country to Barrera, Azua, where we shall enjoy a population of thousands of *Coccothrinax boschiana* practically emerging from the Caribbean Sea to the mountains of Martín García. After eating lunch by the sea we shall continue to the Hotel Costa Larimar, in Barahona (http://hotelcostalarimar.com/).

Wednesday, October 4: We shall travel to Pedernales, on the Haitian border. On the way, we shall stop to see a population of Coccothrinax ekmanii, then continue to the high altitude Sierra de Bahoruco National Park (www.geocities. com/falco67 99/pnsb), where Coccothrinax scoparia grows at 1000 m and within pine forests. We shall also see this small, resilient palm in small populations on the way to Hoyo de Pelempito (http://members.aol.com/aperez11/ pelempito.html), an impressive depression in which we shall contemplate the palms as we eat lunch at the lookout constructed by the park authorities.

Thursday, October 5: We shall have the opportunity to visit the Jaragua National Park, where helicopters will be waiting to take us to visit populations of *Pseudophoenix ekmanii*, without a doubt the most charismatic palm of the

Dominican Republic. It will be a unique opportunity to view thousands of specimens of this spectacular palm from the sky as well as to be able to walk among them.

Friday, October 6: We shall travel back to Santo Domingo, visiting populations of *Pseudophoenix vinifera* and *Copernicia berteroana* in Azua, as well as the spectacular "belly palms" of Baní, *Coccothrinax spissa*.

Saturday, October 7: Back in Santo Domingo there will be several options — tours of the historic center of the colonial city (http://www.sdq.com/colonial/), shopping at craft bazaars, or lunch at the Vivero Inmaculada. At night we shall have a farewell dinner, which will include a colorful Caribbean show.

Sunday, October 8: The biennial will conclude. Attendees will be taken to the airport to return home or continue their travel to other destinations. Those members who wish to see other palms in the Caribbean before turning home should contact Leonel Mera <palmera@codetel.net.do> for recommendations.

We have chosen the month of October because it is after the area's main hurricane season of August and September. Each evening after dinner, we shall hear lectures by specialists from various countries who will discuss the palms of the Antilles and South America, along with the latest advances in palm biology and landscape uses of palms. In Barahona, we shall enjoy presentations of the local culture.

Throughout our travels, we shall be in modern air conditioned buses. Breakfasts will be included, as well as lunches and dinners, except for the two nights in Santo Domingo. The official language will be English, and we shall have at all times guides who speak English, French and Spanish. This is the first time that the IPS has held its biennial within the Caribbean, and we shall surely take back great memories of the Caribbean sun, color and Latin flavor, as well as its palms.

- Raúl Verdecia (Cuba) will provide "An update on Cuban palms, the more important genera and species."
- Franco Simonetti (Chile) will update attendees on the Chilean natural distribution of *Jubaea chilensis*.
- Ricardo García (Dominican Republic) "Palms of the Dominican Republic".
- Elena Beare (Uruguay) will speak on "Blue *Butia* in Uruguay."

Special needs/Handicap services:

New Zealand Palm & Cycad Society

The December meeting of the New Zealand Palm & Cycad Society was well attended, including some new faces. General business was brief and covered the success of the Ellerslie Flower show stand. It was also announced that John Pettit was made an honorary member of the society. The auction was the main event of the evening and there were many palms available. A large number of Chamaedorea and Dypsis species were auctioned. As usual, Alan Booth brought some rare specimens which went quickly. There were 47 plants sold at the auction for a total of NZ\$4,605 (just under NZ\$100 per plant). previous year 40 plants were sold for a total of NZ\$2,865, so the average price was significantly higher this year.

At the February 7th meeting, 30-40 members heard Bill Pepperell speak about his recent trip to South Africa, with a focus on Cycads. Some of the *Encephalartos* in private gardens must be 100s of years old based on their trunk size. There were *E. woodii* plants for sale and while expensive, they were priced much cheaper than seen on the net. Rare species like *E. heenanii* and *E. hirsutus* were available within the province Bill visited. There were nurseries growing many seedlings of these

rarer species. He also showed slides from a garden with all female plants.

There was much heated discussion about the proposed ARC ban on planting the three palms, Archontophoenix cunninghamiana, Phoenix canariensis, and Trachycarpus fortunei. John Pettit and others stressed the importance of individuals putting in their objections and making sure ARC know you oppose the banning.

The Palm Society of Southern California (PSSC) Annual Banquet was held on January 28, 2006, at the Catamaran Resort & Hotel on Mission Bay in San Diego. Speaker for the event was Gregg Hamann from El Cajon, CA, who gave an exciting presentation on "The Palms of Myanmar (Burma)". Known for his worldwide travels in the pursuit of palms, Gregg and his wife, Debbie, have traveled to all corners of the world. Their recent Myanmar produced spectacular photographs of species that are seldom seen. The PSSC has toured Gregg and Debbie's garden several times over the years. It is evident that his passion goes beyond his garden and leads him worldwide to visit tropical habitats.

The March PSSC meeting featured visits to three members' outstanding gardens in the Mission Bay area of San Diego. The first garden visited was that of Gary Michaelis. Gary started his garden in about 1998 and presently offers many juvenile and near mature plants of specimens seldom seen. His collection includes many large rare Dypsis such as D. affinis, D. particularly ankaizinesis. gorgeous a psammophila, perhaps the largest D. saintelucei in California and a nice smaller D. albofarinosa. His New Caledonia collection is also impressive with large Burretiokentia, Cyphophoenix elegans, Actinokentia divaricata, Chambevronia 'watermelon', a very large C. sp "houailou", and a small but happy Cyphosperma balansae. There are many other palms of note. The overall affect is wonderful in Gary's Asian tropics theme, developed with much thought and very beautiful woodwork. He also labels his plants with the name, origin and size & date of planting.

The next garden on the tour was the well established and mature garden of Jim Wright and Lise Rasmussen – one of the most popular gardens in San Diego. This garden of more than 40 years is very impressive because of the shear size of the palms. especially the Euterpe Rhopalostylis, Hedyscepe, Veitchia, Kentiopsis oliviformis, Ptychosperma and many others. Some appear to be over 50' tall. Jim has created a dense canopy with smaller palms shaded beneath, species including many of Linospadix, Lytocaryum, Rhapis, Pinanga, a huge collection of Chamaedorea (including a hybrid named after him) and some unusual Dypsis spp. Other rare palmeriana. specimens include Linospadix Geonoma schottiana and a Ptychosperma burretianum.

Last stop was the garden of Leland Fletcher. Fletch started his garden about twelve years ago and he has a wide selection of unusual palms. As you enter the rear garden, you are transported to Hawaii. Waterfalls and brooks babble and your eyes follow a winding path up a hill that the average Southern California homeowner would have "iceplanted". During the past twelve years Fletch has created a vertical landscape that allows the palms to be seen at eye level. The garden is planted so that you have space to breath and move around the grass lounging area and can step back to view his hillside full of palms. He has a large collection of healthy palms including many Coccothrinax and Pritchardia as well as other nice specimens such as Hyphorbe lagenicaulis, Dictvosperma album, Dvpsis lastelliana, D. cabadae and Zombia.

Biographical Information on Candidates for IPS Board of Directors Positions 2006-2010

Elena Beare from Uruguay, South America, has been an IPS member since 1994, and with her husband George, has attended four IPS Biennials. She has owned a floral design business which she later expanded into a landscaping business. As a member and past President of the Garden Clubs of Uruguay, she has lectured throughout her country. In the early 1990's Elena's love of palms drove her to buy a farm for palm production where she now grows two-acres with more than 2000 butias, queens and washingtonias. Elena's aim is to start a Uruguay palm society affiliate and to help preserve the world's largest natural stand of *Butia capitata* in Rocha, Uruguay.

Norman Bezona is a University of Hawaii Agricultural Extension agent with responsibilities in ornamental horticulture, forestry, and environmental studies. He has been a member of the IPS since 1961 and was active in the Society in Florida before moving to the "Volcano Island" of Hawaii where he lives on 60 acres of montane cloud forest. His gardens serve as a classroom for local students, residents and tourist groups who wish to learn about native and exotic plant species. He writes many articles about palms for newspapers and publications. Norm is one of the founders of the Hawaii Island Palm Society and remains an active member.

Faith Fessenden Bishock fell in love with palms after buying her first house in Coral Gables, Florida, from a palm grower. She then joined Fairchild Tropical Garden and began her study of palms. She joined the IPS in 1980 and remains an active member in the South Florida Chapter. Santiago Orts of Alicante, Spain, received a Degree in Biology Sciences at the University of Murcia. Jeanne Price was born in the UK and developed a love of palms during a two and a half year tour of work in Fiji. She moved to Brisbane, Australia and joined the Palm and Cycad Association of Australia (PACSOA) in 1988. She attended the 1988 Biennial in N. Queensland as a visitor. In 1990 Jeanne and her husband John joined the IPS and attended the biennials in Thailand and New Caledonia. She assists her husband with acquiring and editing articles for *Palms and Cycads* and has co-authored several articles for the magazine. She has been a director of PACSOA since 1993 and is currently Secretary of the Sunshine Coast branch of PACSOA.



Fernando Roca (Padre Paco): I have a Ph.D. in Social Anthropology from La Sorbonne, Paris, in ethnobotany. My doctoral thesis described the Botanical Classification System of the indigenous Jivaro Group in the North Amazonian rainforest of Peru. I chose two botanical groups, palms (very well classified and named) and orchids (very poorly classified) and over 15 years developed an ethnobotanical garden in the area of Santa Maria de Nieva, Province Condorcanqui, Department Amazonas, Peru; this is probably the best palmetum of the Peruvian Amazonian rainforest. At present I am engaged in establishing another garden in the South Peruvian Amazonian rainforest in the Department of Madre de Dios, Manu-Tambopata, the richest area for palms in the Amazonian rainforest and home of the Inkaterra group. I also teach at the university in Peru and am planning with Luis Bello (another member) to publish botanical guides for Lima; the first one will be about Lima's palm trees. Finally, I am a member of the Fairchild Botanical Garden, the Fous de Palmiers and the European Palm Society. I wrote an article for a recent issue of *Espadice* (published by the Spanish Palm Group, Huerto del Cura-Elche, Alicante), and am writing one for *Le Palmier* and another for *Palms*. At the University I am member of a new commission that will be responsible for the campus plantings and hope that the entire campus will soon become a botanical garden; palms seeds that I have brought from many places are now growing in the university's nursery.

Toby Spanner has been an avid collector of palms since 1987, and made his first plant expedition to China in 1991. Since then he has traveled throughout the world in search of rare and little-known palms. Toby has been a member of the IPS since the late 1980s and heads the German chapter of the European Palm Society. He has published a handbook for growing palms in German, *Das Palmen Kulturhandbuch*, which focuses on his specialization, cold-hardy palms. Toby has also authored and co-authored numerous articles in *Principes* (now *Palms*), *The Palm Journal*, and *Chamaerops*, and has been featured in radio and television interviews, and in several German gardening magazines. Toby owns a nursery in Munich, Germany, and distributes seeds to more than 75 countries.
