Biennial Overview

The 2006 IPS Biennial is being sponsored by the International Palm Society with Leonel Mera as our local host in Dominican Republic. The Dominican Republic shares the island of Hispaniola with Haiti and takes up the eastern two-thirds of the island. Its population is about 9 million people and Santo Domingo is the capital. Tourism is one of the biggest industries so the country is well set up to accommodate visitors.

The Biennial will begin and end in Santo Domingo. We will travel to the southwestern area of the country and stay in the city of Barahona during the middle of the trip. We will visit the National Botanical Garden as well as go to many habitats of native and endemic palms. We complete the tour by returning to Santo Domingo, where we will get a chance to experience the culture of the country. A farewell dinner will bring the tour to its close.

Palm & Cycad Society of Western Australia News

At the March 2006 PACSOWA general meeting, George Sevastos gave a talk on the six species of Livistona native to Western Australia: L. mariae, L. estonia, L. loriphylla, L. victoriae, L. alfredii and L. occidentalis. This was the first time that these palms have been discussed in depth at a PACSOWA meeting. Phil Loffman gave a short talk on Ceroxylon quindiuense, the Andean Wax Palm, which in its native Colombia grows to be one of the world's tallest palms reaching up to 60m or ~200 feet tall. This is a dioecious palm that grows at 2,000-3,500m (6,500-11,500 feet) in altitude. It has fronds up to 6m (20 feet) in length and a whitish looking trunk caused by a waxy extrusion that gives the palm its name.

At the April 25th general meeting, Iain McGregor demonstrated a prototype of an ingenious new invention designed to trap mosquitoes for research and other purposes. It uses dry ice (CO2) (as mosquitoes home in on human breath trails to find their prey) to attract the insects into a cylinder fitted with a small computer fan which then sucks them into a sealed chamber. You simply open the trap in the morning and dispose of the insect bodies. The beauty of this trap is that it only catches biting insects and not non-harmful insects. While not in commercial production yet, a simple do-ityourself version could be made using everyday components for about A\$50. George Sevastos then gave a short talk on the beautiful cycad Encephalartos lanatus.

About 30 members took the PACSOWA bus trip on Sunday, April 23rd, driven by experienced bus driver John Banasiewicz. The trip began with a visit to Botanic Obsession, the garden of Faye and Eddie Arcaro, followed by a free sausage sizzle lunch and tour of John Banasiewicz's garden among the tropical rainforest plants, fern house, frog pond, bandicoots and dozens of other attractions in Jandakot. On the way north from John's to Premier Palms, the bus stopped briefly alongside

some points of interest, including the amazing garden of Cliff Britto and a most spectacular Cuban Royal Palm specimen in a Parkwood. Members then took a visit to Reg and Dale Lysle's Premier Palms nursery in High Wycombe. It was a great day and there were some great bargains.

May 23rd featured the big PACSWOA annual auction, headed up by auctioneer Russell Dyer. Details were not available at press time, but there were at least 59 lots of plants slated for auction, many of them great finds.

At the end of April, PACSOWA participated in Garden Week, held at Perry Lakes from April28th (Friday) through May 3rd (Wednesday.) This major event of the WA gardening calendar gave the Society lots of exposure. PACSOWA had a small but impressive display and was able to hand out flyers and membership applications to interested members of the public. There was no sale of plants at this event.

On a personal note, congratulations to Gary Pike on his election as vice-President of the Western Australian Horticultural Council (WAHC,) the peak body for all amateur gardening groups in WA. In addition to his role on the WAHC executive, Gary will also act as a as a delegate for the Palm and Cycad Society. [Gary also serves as Editor of the PACSOWA PalmsWest newsletter.]

New Zealand Palm & Cycad Society

The April meeting of the New Zealand Palm & Cycad Society was attended by about thirty members and guests. A call for helpers for the Annual Sale on April 8–9th was made and there was a request for new committee members to step forward for the AGM in October. The evening's program was provided by John Pettit, who spoke on his trip to Portugal. As they have no native palms, a mixture of all sorts were seen there, many of which grow here in New Zealand. These included *Brahea*, *Sabal*, *Archontophoenix*, *Washingtonia*, *Howea* and *Chamaerops*, among others. John told of Kentia palms growing under

cover that were so tall the tops poked out and looked like miniature palms with lots of seeds. Most cycads visible were *Cycas revoluta* and some *Encephalartos* and *Zamia* species.

A Palm and Cycad sale was held April 8–9th at the Auckland Botanical Gardens in Manurewa.

The May meeting was attended by a small crowd. General business was covered, followed by the program for the night. This was provided by a knowledgeable speaker from Pacific Growers. He gave a short presentation that covered weed-killers, safety equipment and a range of products serving different applications.

The New Zealand Palm & Cycad Society held a subtropical sale on May 27 and 28th, at the ASB Stadium, Kohimarama.

The NZ Seed Bank has sent out a number of seeds recently. including palm species Acrocomia aculeata, Brahea decumbens, hapala, Burretiokentia Guihaia argyrata, Nannorrhops ritchiana, Pritchardia hillebrandii, Rhapis excelsa, Socratea exorrhiza, Syagrus sancona and Trachycarpus princeps. Gary also had some cycad seeds: Dioon merolae, D. holmgrenii, Encephalartos altensteinii, transvenosus, E. villosus, E. natalensis x woodii, and E. trispinosus x lehmannii. Per a recent e-mail announcement, the NZ seed bank was also expecting Ceroxylon ventricosum, C. vogelianum, Dypsis baronii, Laccospadix sp., Lytocaryum sp. and Parajubaea cocoides in April or May.

News from Palmeraie-Union, La Réunion Chapter

The 2006 General Assembly of Palmeraie-Union was held on April 30th in Saint-Leu, where Max Galbois welcomed members in the beautiful environment of Pointe des Châteaux. President Thierry Hubert presented the annual report and recounted the activities of the prior year.

Many private gardens were visited. including Bruno Ricquebourg's in Saint-Denis, Rashid Ghanty's and Henri Law Waï's in Les Avirons, all offering impressive collections of palms to visitors. In July and November we went exploring wild populations of Hyophorbe indica and Acanthophoenix crinita. For the first time, we organized a successful annual banquet, held on December 3rd in the mountain spa resort of Cilaos. More recently we revisited Lauricourt Grosset's property in Jean-Petit, which includes collections of palms, orchids and endemic plants from Reunion. On Sunday March 5th members visited Olivier Coton's garden in Terre-Rouge and my own [Nicole Ludwig] garden in Petite-Île.

We continue our partnership with the city of Le Tampon on the Palmetum project in Trois Mares; the nursery is growing some 50,000 young palms of 460 different species (twice as many as one year ago).

We are involved in all the steps of protection of our endemic palms, including emblematic Latania lontaroides and the newly identified Acanthophoenix rousselii. Christophe Lavergne and Nicole Ludwig inventoried and studied three remnant populations of red latan inside Saint-Pierre town limits, while Eloi Boyer harvests seeds and grows young plants of A. rousselii for further reintroduction into their natural habitat.

The last issue of *Latania* focused on *Latania* lontaroides, the visit of two gardens near Saint-Denis in the north of the island and the diary of a journey to Brazil; the next issue will be published in June. Asociación Venezolana de Palmas AVEPALMAS

On April 22-23, AVEPALMAS, the Venezuelan Palm Society, participated in the Bromeliad Exposition (*La Exposición de Bromelias*) in CorpBanca with first order botanical material and many rare species.

On April 24th, AVEPALMAS met at the offices of the Ministra del Ambiente, Ing. Jacqueline Farías, to discuss UNESCO "Patrimonio Natural de la Humanidad el Parque Nacional Guatopo" and the extension to "Bosque Steyermark" (near the Gulf of Triste,) which includes the higher elevations of the "Serranía del Interior" east of San Casimiro.

On April 30th, AVEPALMAS took an initial exploration to the Gulf of Triste in the Bosque Steyermark with participants Edilia C. de Borges, Rosana Lagerano, Thamara Gutierrez, Eduardo Machado and Sven Nehlin. The trip was to examine from 720 to 1120 meters using a 4wheel drive vehicle. The second excursion to explore the entrance to Bosque Steyermark was done on May 14-15th, and reached to 1600m. Eight people participated in examining the typical local flora: aroids, pipers, heliconias, orchids and bromeliads. Also reviewed were Pouteria guianensis, Ormosia tovarensis, the palm Dictyocaryum fuscum and other species. At the higher elevations a typical and abundant palm is Asterogyne spicata, a spectacular palm with a bright red new leaf. This palm is endemic to the Parque Nacional de Guatopo.

AVEPALMAS held their monthly meeting on May 2nd at the La Salle institute, to dedicate the video of Judith Musso, entitled "Ciudades Sustentables, Según el Programa 21" (see www.un.org/esa/sustdev/documents/agenda21/sp anish/agenda21sptoc.htm).

On May 24th, the group met in the auditorium of the Jardín Botánico and planted a *Bismarckia nobilis* palm and a *Licania platipus* tree (or Sonzapote) in the garden.

On May 28th, AVEPALMAS visited various fruit and palm trees as well as other plants. In addition, on this "Day of the Tree," AVEPALMAS participated in the planting of a number of trees at the Venezuelan Institute of

Scientific Investigations. Among these the following species were included: Licania sp.; Eschweilera fendleriana, Juglans venezuelsensis, Gyranthera caribensis, Caryodendron orinocense, Pouteria guianensis and the wax palm Ceroxylon ceriferum.

AVEPALMAS is scheduled to meet on June 6th on the fifth floor of the Fundación La Salle. On the agenda is discussion of future excursions "the Route of the Palms: Cañaveral, Osma, La Sabana, Caruao" (two days) and "the Palms of the Bosques of Colonia Tovar: Exploring the forest of the Hacienda Ecológica Guáquira" in the state of Yaracuy. (2 or 3 days.)
