2008 IPS Biennial Meeting, Costa Rica

The 2008 Biennial Meeting of the International Palm Society will be held in Costa Rica on May 3 – 10, 2008. The Biennial will kick off in San José and then move into other areas of the country, visiting a number of palms in habitat. IPS Biennial Committee Chair Leland Lai is coordinating the event for the IPS.

An IPS-sponsored Post Biennial Tour to Peru will follow immediately after the conclusion of the 2008 Biennial. Shorter options within Costa Rica are also being explored.

Registration and itinerary details are provided in a separate *Biennial Supplement* accompanying this issue of *Palms* and are also available on www.palms.org.

Call for Nominations for IPS Board of Directors for 2008 – 2012 Term of Office

It is time for the election of those IPS Directors who will serve for the years 2008 to 2012. If there is anyone you know who can contribute to the goals of the International Palm Society and who is willing to dedicate the time necessary to serve as a Director, please submit his/her name for nomination.

The Administrative Secretary, Larry Noblick, must receive nominations by November 10, 2007. The election ballots will be mailed with the December 2007 issue of *Palms* and must be returned no later than March 15th, 2008 to be counted. Elections results will be announced on the IPS website in early April and published in the June 2008 *Supplement* to *Palms*.

Nominating requirements: A candidate must have been a Member of the Society for two years before being nominated as a Director. Any IPS Member may propose a candidate for nomination by writing an email or letter to the Administrative Secretary. A second nomination in writing from another Member is also required. The proposed candidate must submit to the Secretary a written consent of willingness to serve if nominated and elected, which should include a willingness to attend board meetings during his or her tenure. The proposed candidate must also send the Secretary a short palm-related biography, which will be included on the ballot.

When the above conditions have been met, the Secretary will forward the proposed candidate's name to the Nominating Committee for consideration as a nominee on the ballot.

Nominating Committee guidelines: Directors are elected for a four-year term with terms staggered so that approximately half the Directors will be installed at each Biennial meeting. The Nominating Committee will use the regional distribution of members as a guide for insuring worldwide representation.

Duties and expectations of the IPS Directors: The Board of 34 Directors has general charge of the affairs and business of the Society including the management of the Society's funds. Directors are expected to take an active role in Board activities by serving on appropriate committees set up for specific tasks and concerns. The Board meets once a year, at the Biennial meeting or at an Interim Meeting (with the interim meeting usually in the USA).

An ability and willingness to travel to all (or most) of the annual Board Meetings at the Director's own expense is, by necessity, a strong consideration used by the Nominating Committee when selecting candidates. Directors are also expected to be accessible by e-mail.

Directors for the 2008 – 2012 term will be installed at the Board of Directors Meeting in May 2008 at the time of the Costa Rica Biennial.

2008 IPS Endowment Fund Applications

Applications must be received by December 31st of this year for consideration for a 2008 IPS Endowment Fund grant. Grants will be awarded in May 2008 at the IPS Biennial Board meeting.

For applications to be considered, they must be sent to Endowment Committee chair, Jim Cain, prior to December 31st, 2007. Proposals should be sent in MS Word or Adobe PDF documents as e-mail attachments to palm_dude@pobox.com. If the documents exceed 6MB in size, please send them to jimmydcain@aol.com instead (e-mails totaling up to 16MB, including attachments, will be received at that address.)

Proposals should include the following information, along with any other information that applicants think might increase their chances for favorable review of their proposals:

 Please submit a Narrative Proposal Section with a clear description of the project to be funded. This should include adequate details for independent scientific reviewers to assess the feasibility and desirability of the project work. This should also address the desired project timetable in a general way, again to provide clarity to the reviewers.

- Submit a clear and readable budget for the full project, along with the amount of funding requested from the IPS, and the amount of the total project funding that is expected to be obtained from other sources. Please also state whether or not "partial funding" of the IPS amount would be acceptable (and still allow the project to be undertaken)
- Send a current Curriculum Vitae of the applicant and of the other key researchers involved in the project. This information should include contact information for the application [postal address, email address(es), telephone(s) and fax numbers.]
- Provide a statement with the name of the person or institution who should receive the grant payment if the application is successful (i.e., the individual, the individual's university or employee, etc.)

The IPS grants about US\$20,000 in a given year if suitable applications are received. Typically individual awards are between \$1,000 and \$5,000, although larger grants are sometimes awarded. Applications must be accompanied by a statement on the acceptability of "partial funding". Without such a clear statement, the IPS may be forced to turn down such an application if the entire requested amount cannot be awarded.

Thirty to forty people attended the June general meeting. Many Nikau palms have been transplanted to Queen Street, where there are a large number of mature specimens. Reportedly, they were sourced from New Plymouth and South Island. The night's speaker was Phil Walker of Natural Tree Products. He described the plant-hire trade which is a big part of his

business. *Kentia* and *Rhapis* are the best palms for the hire business.

A garden visit to Landsendt was held on the Sunday following the June meeting.

The August meeting featured a talk by NZP&CS President Terry Behersing who spoke on his 30 years in the landscaping business. Terry's landscapes appear simple by effectively limiting palms to several species along with a few of the more common cycads with user-friendly fronds. Terry also showed the plan for the upcoming Ellerslie show in which the society display will focus on cycads.

Recent ARC documentation indicated the following recommendations.

- Phoenix canariensis to be banned from sale, movement, or planting from a point in 2010.
- Archontophoenix cunninghamiana and Trachycarpus fortunei to remain on the list of plants under suspicion for the next five years, but with no controls on them. In other words, they'll have another go in five years time on these two species.

These decisions can now be appealed to the Environment Court if one has sufficiently deep pockets and commitment.

The main theme for the next issue of the PACSONZ magazine will be *Parajubaea*, with comments from local members who have tried to grow it or have seen it growing in New Zealand.
